PURPOSE AND EFFECT: The purpose of the proposed rule changes is to (1) update and clarify requirements for the issuance of permits for the importation and possession of conditional and prohibited species; (2) codify eligibility requirements for issuance of such permits; (3) establish criteria for denial of research permits for conditional and prohibited species; and (4) retain conditional and prohibited species status for any taxa that subsequently undergoes any taxonomic alterations, such as reclassifying into a different genus or splitting into subspecies.

The Commission is considering changes to state regulations that would: (1) revise protocols for importation of leopard (Geochelone pardalis), African spurred (Geochelone sulcata) and Bell's hingeback tortoises (Kinixys belliana); (2) prohibit the outdoor culture and harvest of Nile perches (family Latidae) from aquaculture facilities using fee fishing; (3) add the Northern largemouth bass (Micropterus salmoides salmoides) as a conditional species to prevent the genetic contamination of the native Florida subspecies; and (4) add the Quagga mussel (Dreissena bugensis) as a prohibited species, which has been as problematic as zebra mussels in the Great Lakes, and the genus Dreissena is on the federal list of injurious wildlife.

The effects of these rule changes will be stricter, more consistent regulations regarding the importation and possession of certain nonnative species, conditional species and prohibited species. These species are considered to be dangerous to the ecology and/or the health and welfare of the people of Florida. By adopting these regulations the State of Florida will be contributing to the effort to prevent introductions of non-native species.

SUMMARY: Rule 68-5.001, F.A.C. (Introduction of Non-native Species into the State) would be amended to codify eligibility requirements for issuance of research permits for conditional species, establish criteria for denial of research permits for conditional and prohibited species and revise protocols for importation of leopard, African spurred and Bell's hingeback tortoises. Rule 68-5.002, F.A.C. (Conditional Non-native species) would be amended so that the owners of certain aquaculture facilities where Nile perches are possessed will be limited to using indoor facilities and prohibited from allowing take on a fee or for-hire basis using hook and line or rod and reel and that the Northern largemouth bass

(Micropterus salmoides salmoides) would be added as a conditional species while allowing possession of hybrid bass on the Suwannee River and its tributaries and to the north and west of same. Rule 68-5.003, F.A.C. (Prohibited Non-native Species) would be amended so the Quagga mussel (Dreissena bugensis) would be added as a prohibited species. Quagga mussels are closely related to the zebra mussel, which is already a prohibited species.

(a) Such <u>special</u> permits may be issued only to individuals or institutions engaged in research, or to commercial import or export businesses, <u>or to</u> public aquaria, public zoological parks, or public exhibitors <u>that have current accreditation by the</u> <u>Association of Zoos and Aquariums, the American Association</u> <u>of Museums or the Zoological Association of America</u> <u>providing educational exhibits</u>. <u>Special pP</u>ermits shall not be issued for display of these species in private aquaria, private zoological parks, or for personal possession.

(3) Prohibited Non-native Species – No person shall import into the state, sell, possess, or transport any live specimens of the species or hybrids or eggs thereof listed in Rule 68-5.003, F.A.C., except as provided in paragraphs (a) and (b) below: (a) Public aquaria, zoological parks, or public exhibitors <u>that have with</u> current accreditation by the American Zoo and Aquarium Association or the American Association of Museums <u>may</u> will be <u>issued granted</u> a <u>special</u> permit <u>for</u> <u>public exhibition purposes</u>.

(b) Individuals or institutions engaged in research may be granted such a <u>special</u> permit, provided the following requirements are met:

<u>2.</u>4. A detailed research proposal shall accompany the application for the research permit. The proposal shall state with particularity research objectives, methodology and study duration, and outline planned safeguards per FWC laboratory protocols to assure proper containment of the species. <u>An annual record of progress toward the research project objectives will be maintained, and such research proposal and record of progress shall be available for inspection upon request of Commission personnel.</u>

<u>3.2.</u> All research on prohibited aquatic species shall be conducted in indoor facilities in containers <u>or other</u> <u>confinement facilities designed to prevent escape and</u> having no <u>exterior</u> water discharge or having a water discharge through a closed drain system that terminates in a dry-bed wastewater <u>retention area with no public access pond</u>.

<u>4.3.</u> All research on prohibited terrestrial wildlife species shall be conducted in indoor facilities in cages or other confinement facilities which to prevent escape.

5. Commission approved laboratory protocols will be followed for research involving prohibited species. In the event that there are no protocols for a given species on an application, laboratory protocols will be developed, submitted by the applicant and approved by the Commission before a permit will be issued.

6. All research facilities where research on prohibited species is to be conducted will be inspected by Commission personnel or an authorized representative of the Commission prior to issuance of a special permit. Scheduled and unannounced inspections may be conducted at any time during the permit period.

7. Applications for research involving prohibited species may be denied based on lack of benefit to the State of Florida.

<u>8.4.</u> The special permit <u>will shall</u> expire 12 months from the date of issuance. A new special permit will not be issued and shall not be renewed until a <u>new application and</u> detailed report of research findings is received and approved by the Commission. The report <u>will shall</u> include a description of activities undertaken in the permit period, progress toward research project objectives, and proposed additional activities to be undertaken during any renewal period. Such reports are public records subject to the requirements for public disclosure under Chapter 119, F.S.

Written notice of each shipment, a</u> <u>copy of the tortoise import permit and certified veterinary</u> <u>health certificates for each tortoise that is to be imported will</u> <u>be submitted to the Commission no less than 10 days before</u> <u>arrival of any tortoise.</u> all shipping containers used to transport such tortoises are incinerated within 24 hours;

<u>1. Containers used to transport shipments of tortoises will</u> be disinfected prior to importation and will be incinerated or exported out of state within 72 hours.

2. Residents that hold a valid special permit to import tortoises for commercial use will maintain a record of the sale/transfer of all specimens for a period of one year following the receipt of each shipment. This information will include the name(s) and address(es) of recipients and numbers of unsold tortoises including mortalities during the tracking period.

(b) Geographic range in the form of either extent of occurrence estimated to be less than 40 square miles or area of occupancy estimated to be less than 4 square miles, and estimates indicating any two of the following:

1. Severity fragmented or known to exist at only a single location.

2. Continuing decline, observed, inferred or projected, in any of the following:

a. Extent of occurrence.

b. Area of occupancy.

c. Area, extent, and/or quality of habitat.

d. Number of locations or subpopulations.

e. Number of mature individuals.

3. Extreme fluctuations in any of the following:

a. Extent of occurrence.

b. Area of occupancy.

c. Number of locations or subpopulations.

d. Number of mature individuals.

(c) Population size estimated to number fewer than 250 mature individuals and either:

1. An estimated continuing decline of at least 25% within three years or one generation, whichever is longer (up to a maximum of 100 years in the future), or

a. Population structure in the form of either no subpopulation estimated to contain more than 50 mature individuals, or at least 90% of mature individuals in one subpopulation.

SUMMARY: The proposed rule would clarify that bobcats may be taken under the authority of this rule only when the bobcat is causing or about to cause property damage, or when a bobcat is a threat to public safety; allow humane euthanasia as defined by the American Veterinary Medical Association; clarify that a chemical repellant may be used, but it is not an approved exclusion device for removal of bats from a structure; require live traps and snares to be inspected at least once every 24 hours; require live-captured nuisance wildlife to be released or euthanized within 24 hours of capture or trap inspection; and allow the transportation and release of nuisance wildlife at an off-site location if the following conditions are met: The nuisance wildlife must be a native species; the release site is within the same county of capture; the release site is a minimum of 40 contiguous acres; the person releasing the nuisance wildlife has written permission from the owner of the release site and the transportation of wildlife does not violate any rabies alert or area quarantine issued by a County Health Department or County Animal Service.

Any person owning property may take nuisance wildlife or they may authorize another person to take nuisance wildlife on their behalf except those species listed in subsection (1) below on their property by any method except those methods listed in subsection (2) below. Persons responsible for government owned property are considered "landowners" for the purpose of this rule. <u>Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, the</u> The executive director or a designee may issue permits authorizing authorize the take of additional species of wildlife, or additional methods of take or alternative forms of disposition and transportation for justifiable purposes by permit issued pursuant to Rule 68A-9.002, F.A.C., provided authorizations shall be denied or revoked upon reasonable conclusion that the requested or permitted activity would be detrimental to fish and wildlife resources or public health and safety.

(1) Wildlife that may not be taken as nuisance wildlife:

(a) No change.

(b) The following mammals:

1. through 2. No change.

3. Bats – Except that bats may be taken either when:

a. <u>The That</u> take is incidental to the use of an exclusion device, a device which allows escape from and blocks re-entry into a roost site located within a structure, or incidental to the <u>use of a registered chemical repellant</u>, (including chemical repellants), at any time from August 15 to April 15 or

b. <u>The That</u> take is incidental to permanent repairs which prohibit the egress of bats from a roost site located within a structure provided an exclusion device as described in sub-subparagraph a. above is used for a minimum of four consecutive days/nights for which the low temperature is forecasted by the U.S. National Weather Service to remain above 50° F prior to repairs and during the time-period specified.

<u>4. Bobcat – Except that a bobcat may be taken, as provided by subsections (2), (3) and (4) below, when it causes or is about to cause property damage, or presents a threat to public safety.</u>

(c) No change.

(2) Methods that may not be used to take nuisance wildlife:

(a) Gun and light, except as provided in paragraph (5)(b) (4)(b) below.

(b) No change.

(c) Live traps and snares unless they are visited at intervals not exceeding 24 hours.

(c) through (e) renumbered (d) through (f) No change.

(3) Disposition of live-captured nuisance wildlife.

(a) Wildlife live captured by any method shall be released or euthanized within 24 hours following capture or inspection of a trapping device containing wildlife, provided any species described in subsection (1) above or any non-target wildlife shall be released immediately at the site of capture.

(b) Nuisance wildlife may only be released if:

<u>1. The nuisance wildlife is released on the property of the</u> <u>landowner provided the release site and capture site are located</u> <u>on one contiguous piece of property or</u> 2. The nuisance wildlife is a native species and,

3. The property where the nuisance animal is to be released is located within the county of capture and is a minimum of 40 contiguous acres and

<u>4. The person releasing the nuisance wildlife is in possession, at time of release, of written permission from the property owner allowing such action.</u>

(c) Euthanasia of nuisance wildlife shall be humane as defined by the American Association of Zoo Veterinarians or the American Veterinary Medical Association.

(d) The provisions of this subsection shall not prohibit the personal possession of wildlife as authorized by subsection 68A-6.0022(2), F.A.C.

(4)(3) Transportation and release of nuisance wildlife.

(a) Live-captured nuisance wildlife may be transported under authority of this section only for:

<u>1. The purpose of euthanasia as provided in subsection (3)</u> above or

2. The purpose of release as provided in subsection (3) above.

(b) Transportation of wildlife authorized by this section shall not supersede the provisions of any rabies alert or area quarantine issued by County Health Departments or County Animal Services.

(a) Live captured nuisance wildlife transported under authority of this section may be done only for the purpose of euthanizing the nuisance wildlife, provided any euthanasia shall be humane as defined by the American Association of Zoo Veterinarians. Euthanasia of those species listed in subsection 68A-6.0022(2), F.A.C., is not required.

(b) Live captured nuisance wildlife may be released on the property of the landowner provided the release site and capture site are located on one contiguous piece of property.

(5)(4) Take of nuisance wildlife on airport property.

Fall season (gobblers or bearded turkeys only): During the last 58 days of the antlered deer season in the South Zone <u>A</u>; during the first 58 days of the antlered deer season in <u>Zones</u> <u>B and C</u> the Central Zone; and during the first 41 days of the antlered deer season in the Northwest Zone <u>D</u> except in Holmes County where there will be no open season.

2. Spring season (gobblers or bearded turkeys only):

<u>a.</u> Opening on the first Saturday of March and closing 36 days thereafter in the South Zone <u>A</u>. Opening on the third Saturday of March and closing 36 days thereafter in the Central and Northwest Zones <u>B</u>, <u>C</u> and <u>D</u> except in Holmes County where the season will open on the third Saturday of March and close 15 days thereafter.

b. In addition to the season specified in sub-subparagraph a. above, a "Youth Turkey Hunt" shall open on the last Saturday of February and close 1 day thereafter in Zone A and open the second Saturday of March and close 1 day thereafter in Zones B, C and D. Only youth under 16 years of age may hunt and must be under the supervision and in the presence of an adult not younger than 18 years of age. Adults with required license and permits for taking wild turkeys or otherwise exempt from these requirements by Section 379.353, F.S., may participate in the hunt when in the presence of at least one youth under 16 years of age. Adults shall not take wildlife with a gun.

(d) Quail: Opening the second Saturday of November and closing 113 days thereafter. Opening October 1 and closing March 31 for falconry.

(e) Gray squirrel: Opening the second Saturday of November and closing 113 days thereafter. Opening October 1 and closing March 31 for falconry. No open season on fox squirrels.

(f) Rabbit: Throughout the year.

(g) Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraphs (2)(a)-(g) deer of either sex, gobblers or bearded turkeys, gray squirrel and quail may be taken where same are legal game, during an archery season opening 49 days prior to the first day of the antlered deer season and closing 29 days thereafter in Zones A, B and C the South Zone, opening 49 days prior to the first day of the antlered deer season and closing 29 days thereafter in the Central Zone, and opening 33 40 days prior to the first day of the antlered deer season and closing 32 29 days thereafter in Zone D the Northwest Zone except that turkey may not be taken in Holmes County.

(h) Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraphs (2)(a), (b), (c), (d), (e), and (h), antlered deer, gobblers or bearded turkeys, gray squirrel and quail may be taken:

1. During a crossbow season opening 19 days prior to the first day of the antlered deer season and closing 4 days thereafter in Zones A, B and C the South Zone; opening 19 days prior to the first day of the antlered deer season and elosing 4 days thereafter in the Central Zone, and opening 4 days after the fourth Thursday in November and closing 4 days thereafter in Zone D on the Monday following Thanksgiving Day and closing 6 days thereafter in the Northwest Zone except that turkey may not be taken in Holmes County.

2. During a muzzleloading gun season opening 14 days prior to the first day of the antlered deer season and closing <u>13</u> 8 days thereafter in <u>Zones A, B and C</u>; the <u>South Zone</u>; opening 14 days prior to the first day of the antlered deer season and closing 8 days thereafter in the Central Zone, and opening <u>9</u> 6 days <u>after prior to</u> the first day of the antlered deer season and closing <u>6</u> 2 days thereafter in <u>Zone D</u> the Northwest <u>Zone</u> except that turkey may not be taken in Holmes County.

3. During a muzzleloading gun season in <u>Zone D</u> the Northwest Zone opening the day following the last day of the antlered deer season and closing <u>6</u> $\frac{10}{10}$ days thereafter, provided that turkeys may not be taken.

(3) Issuance of antlerless deer permits to landowners – Antlerless deer may be taken under permit from the executive director during the crossbow, muzzleloading gun, archery/muzzleloading gun, and antlered deer seasons in accordance with the following:

PURPOSE AND EFFECT: The purpose of the proposed rule changes is to revise specific area regulations on Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs) in the Southwest Region and conform to calendar year date changes. The effect of the proposed rule changes will be to enable the agency to better manage fish and wildlife resources and public use on WMAs.

SUMMARY: The proposed rule changes would adjust season dates to conform to calendar year changes and revise specific area regulations on Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs) in the Southwest Region as follows:

Arbuckle WMA – allow small game hunting with bird dogs, retrievers and dogs with a shoulder height of 15 inches or less; and begin the muzzleloading gun season a week earlier.

Avon Park Air Force Range WMA – allow the use of rimfire rifles; allow waterfowl hunters to hunt in Morgan Hole Creek with or without dogs; open Smith and Old Bravo roads to vehicle traffic 24 hours per day; exempt persons within the passenger compartment of a vehicle from the requirement to wear fluorescent orange garments while in the hunt area; allow the Installation Commander or a designee to authorize certain activities on the area; and allow the Installation Commander to authorize the following within statewide regulation framework: hunts that do not have a 3-point antler restriction, hunts that allow the take of raccoon and opossum at night, hunting in Sandy Point Wildlife Refuge, use of handguns with barrels longer than 9 inches, use of centerfire rifles, use of all-terrain vehicles and airboats, use of vehicles off-road and use of vehicles on roads that are closed between 10 p.m. and 4:30 a.m.

Chassahowitzka WMA – expand the migratory bird hunting season to match the statewide season except waterfowl and coot hunting will continue to be limited to Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays; and establish a raccoon and opossum season that allows hunting from 1.5 hours before sunset on Thursdays until 1.5 hours after sunrise on Sundays in February and May.

Croom WMA – allow the Florida Division of Forestry to provide camping consistent with their regulations; and increase the quota for spring turkey hunts from 10 to 15 permits (no exemptions) for each of three hunts.

Green Swamp WMA – expand the open hunting area from the Cumpressco Unit to the entire WMA during small game season; establish an 8-day wild hog-dog season (the first wild hog-dog hunt will overlap the last 2 weekends of small game season and hunting wild hog with dogs will be prohibited in the Cumpressco Unit [quota of 135, no exemptions] and the second wild hog-dog hunt will occur on the 2 weekends following small game season [quota of 160, no exemptions]); each wild hog-dog quota permit will allow two hunters and a guest hunter, the use of three free-running dogs per quota permit, and only one gun may be used per quota permit; allow camping by permit at the Rock Ridge campground during the wild hog-dog season; allow vehicle access to the Rock Ridge campground after 4:00 p.m. on Friday until 1.5 hours after sunset on Sunday during the wild hog-dog season; and continue to prohibit the possession or consumption of intoxicating beverages.

Green Swamp West Unit WMA – convert the current special-opportunity wild hog hunts to wild hog-still and wild hog-dog quota permit hunts; increase the quota for wild hog-still season from 200 to 225 (no exemptions) and increase the quota for wild hog-dog season from 100 to 150 (no exemptions); prohibit the use of horses during the small game season; during periods open for hunting allow only those persons participating in the hunt to operate a motor vehicle on the area; and issue an additional 40 permits (first-come, first-served at the check station) during small game season to allow the hunting of small game, but not wild hog.

Hickory Hammock WMA – establish a 2-day general gun mobility-impaired season (quota of 5, no exemptions) with a bag limit of one antlered deer (one antler must have at least three points) and one antlerless deer per quota permit, but only the mobility-impaired hunter may harvest an antlerless deer; allow mobility-impaired hunters to operate all-terrain vehicles on the area during the hunt and from 8 a.m. until sunset 1 day prior to the hunt for scouting; and require all mobility-impaired hunt participants to attend a pre-hunt orientation meeting.

Hilochee WMA – establish a raccoon and opossum season and allow hunting from 1.5 hours before sunset on Thursdays until 1.5 hours after sunrise on Sundays in September.

Hilochee WMA, Osprey Unit – establish a 12-day small game season, during which small game and wild hog will be legal to take; prohibit the use of dogs for hunting wild hogs during the small game season; and allow raccoon and opossum hunting at night during the small game season.

KICCO WMA – replace the current Public Small Game Hunting Area hog management hunts (12 days) with the addition of 14 days to the end of the current small game season.

Lake Marion Creek WMA – Prohibit the hunting of bobcat and otter.

2. Archery – September <u>25</u> 26 through October <u>24</u> 25, Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays only.

3. Small game – January $\underline{15}$ $\underline{16}$ through February $\underline{13}$ $\underline{14}$, Saturdays and Sundays only.

<u>4. Wild hog-dog – February 5-13 and 19-27, Saturdays and Sundays only.</u>

5.4. Spring turkey – March 19 20 through April 24 25.

<u>6.5.</u> Fishing and frogging – <u>Allowed Permitted</u> during periods in which hunting is allowed; and Saturdays and Sundays <u>beginning the first Saturday in May and closing 43</u> <u>days thereafter from May 1 to June 13</u>. Fishing and frogging is <u>allowed permitted</u> at all other times provided that access is by foot only.

(b) Legal to take: All legal game, fish, frogs and furbearers. During the wild hog-dog season, the take of deer is prohibited.

(c) Camping: Allowed by permit only and only within the designated campsites at the Rock Ridge Road and 471 campgrounds. Camping is allowed at both campgrounds during archery, general gun and spring turkey seasons. Camping is allowed only at the Rock Ridge Road campground during the wild hog-dog and fishing and frogging season and only at the 471 campground during the small game season. Camping permits are non-transferable. Camping along the Green Swamp Hiking Trail (Florida Trail) is prohibited except by written permission from the Southwest Florida Water Management District. Kitchen stoves, refrigerators and freezers, unless contained in mobile campers are prohibited. Lumber, sheet metal or other building materials is prohibited. The alteration, defacing, moving or tampering in any way with official markings of campsites is prohibited. The use or operation of electrical generators powered by an internal combustion engine is prohibited within the campgrounds beginning each night at 10 p.m. until 4 a.m. A legible copy of the camping permit or the permittee's name and permit number must be visibly affixed to camping shelters. Camping equipment must be removed by 8 p.m. on the last date listed on the camping permit.

(d) General regulations:

1. through 3. No change.

4. Hunters may enter or exit the area at designated access points <u>only and</u> only during hours in which check stations are in operation.

5. Hunting with dogs (other than bird dogs) is prohibited, except that dogs may be used during the wild hog-dog season. During the wild hog-dog season, no more than 3 free-running dogs per wild hog-dog quota permit shall be allowed. During non-hunting periods the possession of dogs shall only be as authorized by the Southwest Florida Water Management District.

6. Vehicles may be operated from 1.5 hours before sunrise until 1.5 hours after sunset during established open seasons, except during the designated fishing and frogging season when vehicles may be operated during daylight hours only. Vehicles may be operated after 8 a.m. until 1.5 hours after sunset one day prior to each archery hunt, general gun season and spring turkey season for scouting. Vehicle access to the designated campsites is allowed at any time after 8 a.m. one day prior to archery hunts, general gun season and spring turkey season until 1.5 hours after sunset on the last day of the hunt or season, and after 4 p.m. on Friday until 1.5 hours after sunset on Sunday during the small game<u>, wild hog-dog</u> and fishing and frogging seasons. Motorized vehicles may be operated only on named or numbered roads, except Stanley Fish Hole, Orange Lake and Tillman Lake roads shall be open only during the designated fishing and frogging season. Bicycles may be operated only on named or numbered roads and designated bicycle trails. During the designated fishing and frogging season Tanic Grade, Powder Grade and Levee Road north of Main Grade will be closed to vehicle traffic.

7. Tracked vehicles, airboats, <u>all-terrain vehicles, horses</u> <u>and unlicensed and unregistered</u> motorcycles, all terrain vehicles and horses are prohibited.

The bag limit for turkey shall be one gobbler (or bearded turkey) per special-opportunity turkey hunt permit. One antlered deer may be taken per special-opportunity deer hunt permit. Antlerless deer (except spotted fawns) may be taken by antlerless deer permit only. Taking of antlered deer not having at least one antler with four or more points is prohibited. Only wild hog may be taken during the wild hog special-opportunity hog-still and special-opportunity hog-dog seasons.

(c) Camping: Camping is allowed at designated campsites during hunting season and at other times by permit from the Southwest <u>Florida</u> Water Management District. Kitchen stoves, refrigerators, and freezers, unless contained in mobile campers are prohibited. Lumber, sheet metal or other building materials is prohibited. Each camper shall assure that their campsite is clean at all times. The alteration, defacing, moving, tampering in any way with official markings of campsites is prohibited.

(d) General regulations:

1. through 2. No change.

3. The use of tracked vehicles, airboats, <u>all-terrain vehicles</u> or <u>unlicensed and unregistered</u> motorcycles or <u>all terrain vehicles</u> is prohibited. The use of horses is prohibited during <u>periods open for hunting the special opportunity hunts</u>.

4. No change.

5. Individuals in possession of a special-opportunity hunt permit <u>or quota permit</u> shall have vehicle access to the area from sunrise to sunset on the day preceding the hunt.

6. Only shotguns may be used during the special-opportunity spring turkey hunts.

7. No change.

8. The use of dogs, other than bird dogs and dogs with a shoulder height of 15 inches or less during the small game season, is prohibited except that no more than three dogs per quota hunt permit may be used during the wild special-opportunity hog-dog season. During the wild hog-dog season, no more than three free-running dogs per quota permit shall be allowed. During non-hunting periods the possession of dogs shall only be as authorized by the Southwest Florida Water Management District.

9. During the <u>wild</u> special opportunity hog-dog season, a <u>quota</u> permit shall <u>allow a hunting group of two persons and a</u> guest, as authorized by Rule 68A-15.005, F.A.C., (3 total) to <u>participate in the hunt</u> be required for each group of two hunters, and only one gun may be <u>used to take wildlife per hunting group</u> possessed per permit.

During the spring turkey season, the bag limit shall be one gobbler (or bearded turkey) per quota hunt permit. During the wild hog-still general gun hog season, only wild hog may be taken. No person shall kill or possess any largemouth bass from Peat Lake, Little Peat Lake, Stock Lake, Hidden Lake, and Turtle Pond. No person shall take, in any one day, more than 20 bluegill, 10 black crappie, or 6 catfish. No person shall kill or possess any bluegill less than 8 inches total length or black crappie less than 10 inches total length. During the raccoon season, only raccoon and opossum may be taken.

(c) No change.

(d) General regulations:

1. All users shall enter and exit the area through designated entrances. Hunters shall check in and out at a check station when entering and exiting the area and shall check all game taken, except during the small game <u>and raccoon</u> season<u>s</u>.

During periods when the area is closed to hunting, public access other than by foot, bicycle, or horse is prohibited, except that motorized vehicles shall be <u>allowed permitted</u> one day prior to the archery, muzzleloading gun, <u>wild hog-still general gun hog</u>, and spring turkey hunts, and by individuals in possession of a valid fishing permit. <u>Persons participating in the raccoon season may operate motorized vehicles from 1.5 hours before sunset on Thursday until 1.5 hours after sunset on Sunday.</u>

No more than one antlerless deer may be taken per quota permit during the archery season. During the spring turkey season, the bag limit for turkey shall be one gobbler (or bearded turkey) per quota permit. Only wild hog may be taken during the <u>wild hog-still general gun hog</u> season.

1. The use of tracked vehicles, <u>airboats</u>, <u>horses</u>, <u>all-terrain</u> <u>vehicles or unlicensed and unregistered</u> motorcycles, airboats, horses, or all-terrain vehicles is prohibited.

(12) Avon Park Air Force Range Wildlife Management Area.

(a) Open season:

1. Archery – September 25 26 through October 24 25 in areas and during days specified by the Installation Commander or a designee.

2. Muzzleloading gun – October 30 31 through November 7 8 in areas and during days specified by the Installation Commander or a designee.

3. General gun – November <u>13</u> 14 through January <u>23</u> 24 in areas and during days specified by the Installation Commander <u>or a designee</u>.

4. Small game – January $\underline{3}$ 4 through March $\underline{6}$ 7 in areas and during days specified by the Installation Commander <u>or a designee</u>.

(b) Legal to take: All legal game, fish, frogs, turtles, and furbearers. Antlered deer, wild hog, and quail may be taken only during days specified by the Installation Commander or a <u>designee</u>. Taking of antlered deer not having at least one antler with three or more points, one inch or more in length, is prohibited <u>except in those areas and during those days as specified by the Installation Commander or a designee</u>.

(c) Camping: In areas and during periods specified by the Installation Commander <u>or a designee</u>.

(d) General regulations:

1. Hunters and individuals accompanying hunters must wear a minimum of 500 square inches of daylight fluorescent orange material above the waist as an outer garment when in any hunt area during muzzleloading gun, general gun, or small game seasons, except those hunting waterfowl in on Morgan Hole Creek, the Kissimmee Marsh or Arbuckle Marsh marshes. Persons within the passenger compartment of a vehicle are not required to wear the fluorescent orange material.

2. Loaded, capped, or primed guns are prohibited and ammunition must be physically separated from guns at check stations, public campsites, the Outdoor Recreation Office, within 50 feet of Frostproof, Kissimmee Road, or Van Eeghan roads, while being transported through the Main Base, or in vehicles parked or being driven on designated roads. The only exception is that loaded, un-capped muzzleloading guns may be possessed in the aforementioned areas and muzzleloading guns may be cleared in the muzzleloading gun pits located at Willingham and Morgan Hole campgrounds. 3. <u>Handguns</u> Pistols with barrels longer than nine inches are prohibited, <u>unless authorized by the Installation</u> <u>Commander or a designee</u>.

7. During the general gun season, hunting in the designated dog-hunt areas is restricted to hunters using dogs, unless hunting waterfowl in <u>Morgan Hole Creek</u>, the Kissimmee <u>Marsh</u> or Arbuckle <u>Marsh</u> marshes. No tree stands may be erected in the designated dog-hunt areas.

9. Hunting and the possession of guns are prohibited in the Sandy Point Wildlife Refuge, <u>unless authorized by the Installation Commander or a designee</u>.

10. Vehicles may be operated only on roads designated by the Installation Commander <u>or a designee</u>. No person shall operate a vehicle off of named or numbered roads, except hunters with bird dogs in the designated vehicle-bird dog areas during the small game season <u>or as authorized by the</u> <u>Installation Commander or a designee</u>.

11. The use of vehicles is prohibited between 10 p.m. and 4:30 a.m. except on Frostproof, <u>Smith</u>, <u>Old Bravo</u> and Kissimmee roads, or in case of emergency. <u>When authorized by the Installation Commander or a designee</u>, these restrictions shall not apply.

<u>16. Hunting as specified in paragraph 68A-24.002(2)(b),</u> F.A.C., is allowed in areas and during days specified by the Installation Commander or a designee.

(13) Croom Wildlife Management Area.

(a) Open season:

1. Muzzleloading gun – October $\underline{29-31}$ $\underline{30}$ -through November 1.

2. General gun – November 13 14 through December 5 6.

3. Small game – December <u>6</u>7 through March <u>6</u>7.

(c) Camping: <u>Prohibited unless authorized by the Division</u> <u>of Forestry.</u> Permitted only at designated campsites. A permit issued by the Division of Forestry is required at the Silver Lake, Twin Ponds, Hog Island, River Junction and East Hunt eampsites.

(d) General regulations:

1. Hunting with dogs is prohibited during the muzzleloading gun and general gun seasons November 14 through December 6. Hunting with dogs is prohibited during the small game season, except bird dogs and dogs with a shoulder height of 15 inches or less may be used to take small game. other than bird dogs is prohibited December 7-16, except that Dogs dogs may be used for hunting fox, raccoon or bobcat during the fox, raccoon and bobcat season., and Dogs used during the fox, raccoon and bobcat season, and dogs with a shoulder height of 15 inches or less may be used to hunt small game during the small game season are only allowed in the portion of the area south of Croom road, bounded on the east by Croom-Rital Road to its juncture with the boundary fence of the Croom Motorcycle Aarea located in Sections 17, 18, 19, 30, 31 and those parts of Sections 7 and 8 lying south of the old railroad right-of-way, Township 22 South, Range 21 East, and thence bounded by said boundary fence. (14) Chassahowitzka Wildlife Management Area.

The bag limit for turkeys shall be one gobbler (or bearded turkey) per spring turkey quota hunt permit. Only wild hog may be taken during the <u>wild general gun</u> hog-dog season. <u>Waterfowl</u> and coot may be taken on Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays only. During the raccoon season, only raccoon and opossum may be taken.

(c) No change.

(d) General regulations:

1. Dogs are prohibited south of County Road 550. Hunting with dogs other than retrievers or bird dogs is prohibited west of the Main grade, on the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service portion of the property. Hunting with dogs other than retrievers or bird dogs is prohibited east of Swamp Grade, except during the <u>wild general gun</u> hog-dog season. Dogs with a shoulder height greater than 17 inches are prohibited in that portion of the area lying east of the Main grade and west of the Swamp grade, except during the <u>wild general gun</u> hog-dog and raccoon seasons season when dogs are allowed east of Main Grade.

During the <u>wild general gun</u> hog-dog season, a quota hunt permit shall <u>allow a hunting group of two persons and a guest, as authorized by Rule 68A-15.005, F.A.C., (3 total) to participate in the hunt be required for each group of two hunters, and only one gun may be <u>used to take wildlife per hunting group possessed per permit</u>.</u>

12. The take of wild hog with the aid of dogs is prohibited, except no more than three <u>free-running</u> dogs per general gun hog dog quota hunt permit may be used during the <u>wild</u> general gun hog-dog season in that portion of the area east of Main Grade and west of U.S. Hwy. 19.

13. No change.

14. During the raccoon season, hunting as specified by paragraph 68A-24.002(2)(b), F.A.C., is allowed.

(15) Hilochee Wildlife Management Area – Osprey Unit.(a) Open season:

8.7. Fishing – Allowed year-round.

(b) Legal to take: All legal game (except deer), fish and furbearers. Only wild hog may be taken during the <u>wild hog</u> general gun hog still and general gun hog dog seasons. Turkey may be taken during the spring turkey season only. During the spring turkey season, the bag limit shall be one gobbler (or bearded turkey) per person. No person shall kill or possess any largemouth bass. No person shall take, in any one day, more than 20 bluegill, 10 black crappie, or 6 catfish. No person shall kill or possess any bluegill less than 8 inches total length or black crappie less than 10 inches total length.

(c) No change.

(d) General regulations:

1. Public access is prohibited from 1.5 hours after sunset until 1.5 hours before sunrise, except during the small game season.

2. No change.

3. The use of airboats, outboard motors larger than 10 horsepower, tracked vehicles, <u>all-terrain vehicles</u>, <u>horses or unlicensed and unregistered</u> motorcycles, all-terrain vehicles, or horses is prohibited, except that horses are allowed on named or numbered roads or designated trails during periods closed to hunting.

During periods when the area is closed to hunting, public access other than by foot, bicycle, or horse is prohibited, except motorized vehicles shall be allowed one day prior to all hunts except small game by persons participating in the hunt possession of a valid quota hunt permit. During small game season, motorized vehicle access is allowed from 1.5 hours before sunrise on the first day of the season until 1.5 hours after sunset on the last day of the season.

6. During periods open for hunting, motorized vehicles shall only be operated by persons <u>participating in the hunt</u>, <u>except during the small game season</u> in possession of a valid quota hunt permit.

7. The use of dogs, other than bird dogs and dogs with a shoulder height of 15 inches or less, is prohibited except that dogs <u>of any size</u> may <u>be</u> by used during the <u>wild general gun</u> hog-dog <u>and small game seasons</u> season. No more than 3 <u>free-running</u> dogs per general gun quota hunt permit shall be used during the <u>wild general gun</u> hog-dog season.

During the <u>wild general gun</u> hog-dog season, a <u>quota</u> permit shall <u>allow a hunting group of two persons and a guest</u>, <u>as authorized by Rule 68A-15.005</u>, F.A.C., (3 total) to <u>participate in the hunt</u> be required for each group of two hunters, and only one gun may be <u>used to take wildlife per hunting group possessed per permit</u>.

<u>10. The take of wild hog with dogs is prohibited during the</u> <u>small game season.</u>

<u>11. During the small game season, hunting as specified by</u> paragraph 68A-24.002(2)(b), F.A.C., is allowed.

PURPOSE AND EFFECT: The purpose of the proposed rule changes is to revise specific area regulations on Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs) in the North Central Region and conform to calendar year date changes. The effect of the proposed rule changes will be to enable the agency to better manage fish and wildlife resources and public use on WMAs.

SUMMARY: The proposed rule changes would adjust season dates to conform to calendar year changes and revise specific area regulations on Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs) in the North Central Region as follows:

Belmore WMA – expand waterfowl season to match statewide dates and allow waterfowl retrievers during that time; and clarify that the bag limit for deer and turkey is one per quota permit.

Big Bend WMA, Hickory Mound Unit – remove size and bag limits for wild hog and allow them to be hunted during the small game season.

Big Bend WMA, Jena Unit – remove size and bag limits for wild hog and allow them to be hunted during the small game season.

Big Bend WMA, Snipe Island Unit – remove requirement to check in and out and to check all game taken, except during the muzzleloading gun season and the first 16 days of the archery, general gun and spring turkey seasons; allow entrance and exit only at designated entrances during the archery, muzzleloading gun, general gun and spring turkey seasons; allow wild hog to be hunted during the small game season; and clarify that the bag limit for deer is one per quota permit per day and the bag limit for turkey is one per quota permit.

Big Bend WMA, Spring Creek Unit – remove size and bag limits for wild hog and allow them to be hunted during the small game season.

Big Bend WMA, Tide Swamp Unit – remove size and bag limits for wild hog and allow them to be hunted during the small game season; and remove the quota requirement for the muzzleloading gun and general gun seasons.

Camp Blanding WMA – allow turkey to be hunted on the still hunt area during the last two days of each of the two general gun still quota periods and the first two days of the non-quota period of the general gun still season; allow turkey to be hunted on the dog hunt area during the last three days of each general gun dog hunt; and remove the quota requirement for the archery hunts.

Cary WMA – add approximately 4,000 acres to the existing area; increase the number of archery, muzzleloading gun and general gun quota permits from 60 to 100; increase the number

of family hunt quota permits from 40 to 65; increase the number of spring turkey quota permits from 10 to 20; reduce the bag limit for deer during archery season from two deer per day (any combination of antlered and antlerless) to one antlered or one antlerless deer per quota permit; reduce bag limit for deer during family hunt from two deer per day (any combination of antlered and antlerless) to one antlered and one antlerless deer per quota permit; reduce bag limit for deer during muzzleloading gun and general gun season from two antlered deer per day to one antlered deer per quota permit; reduce bag limit for spring turkey season from one bearded turkey or gobbler per day to one bearded turkey or gobbler per quota permit; expand the waterfowl season to match the statewide dates and allow waterfowl retrievers during that time; and allow public access only from 1.5 hours before sunrise until 1.5 hours after sunset unless in possession of an access permit from the Division of Forestry.

Citrus WMA – prohibit camping except as authorized by the Division of Forestry; and remove quota permit requirement for the second archery hunt.

Cypress Creek WMA – allow public access only from 1.5 hours before sunrise until 1.5 hours after sunset unless in possession of a Special Use Authorization from the Suwannee River Water Management District.

Devil's Hammock WMA – allow nighttime hunting of raccoons, with dogs, during the small game season by persons in possession of a Special Use Authorization from the Suwannee River Water Management District; and add a 4-week hog-still season (no quota) during which time only wild hogs will be legal to take.

Flying Eagle WMA – allow hunting equipment to be taken onto the area beginning at 8 a.m. the day before each hunt and require it to be removed on the last day of each hunt; and during spring turkey season allow hunting equipment beginning 1.5 hours before sunrise the day preceding each hunt.

Four Creeks WMA – clarify that the bag limit for deer and turkey is one per quota permit.

Goethe WMA – require motor vehicles to enter the area only at designated entrances but allow people on foot to enter at any location.

Grove Park WMA – add a 56-day small game season.

Hatchet Creek WMA – clarify that the bag limit for deer and turkey is one per quota permit.

Holton Creek WMA – allow public access only from 1.5 hours before sunrise until 1.5 hours after sunset unless in possession of a Special Use Authorization from the Suwannee River Water Management District.

Jennings Forest WMA – establish a quail enhancement area north of the North Fork Black Creek, east of County Road 217 and west of Yellow Water Creek (approximately 5,471 acres) and allow up to eight days of quail hunting, with no more than four quota permits per day (no exemptions, up to two hunters per quota permit) in January and February with a bag limit of six per quota permit; establish a waterfowl season that coincides with the statewide dates; allow waterfowl retrievers during the waterfowl season; increase the number of general gun hunts from two 5-day hunts and one 6-day hunt to four 4-day hunts (quota 60) and increase the number of spring turkey hunts from a 4-day and 5-day hunt to three 3-day hunts (quota 30).

Little River WMA – allow public access only from 1.5 hours before sunrise until 1.5 hours after sunset unless in possession of a Special Use Authorization from the Suwannee River Water Management District.

Mallory Swamp WMA – eliminate requirement to check game; replace the first-come first-served permits issued at the check station for the muzzleloading gun and general gun still and dog seasons with quota permits issued through the Total Licensing System (total number of permits will remain the same); allow nighttime raccoon hunting during the small game season by persons in possession of a Special Use Authorization from the Suwannee River Water Management District; lengthen the small game season by 14 days; add a 3-day hog-dog season during which only wild hog will be legal to take; and allow public access only from 1.5 hours before sunrise until 1.5 hours after sunset unless is possession of a Special Use Authorization from the Suwannee River Water Management District.

Middle Aucilla WMA – allow public access only from 1.5 hours before sunrise until 1.5 hours after sunset unless in possession of a Special Use Authorization from the Suwannee River Water Management District.

Potts WMA – allow the use of horses only during periods closed to hunting; allow hunting and camping equipment to be taken onto the area beginning 8:00 a.m. the day before each hunt and require it be removed on the last day of each hunt; and during spring turkey season allow hunting equipment beginning 1.5 hours before sunrise the day preceding each hunt.

San Pedro Bay WMA – this WMA was removed from the WMA system by the landowner, just prior to the 2009-2010 season; therefore, all the rules need to be eliminated.

Steinhatchee Springs WMA – allow public access only from 1.5 hours before sunrise until 1.5 hours after sunset unless in possession of a Special Use Authorization from the Suwannee River Water Management District; remove requirement to check game; replace the first-come first-served quota permits issued at the check station for the muzzleloading gun, general gun and spring turkey seasons with quota permits issued through the Total Licensing System (total number of permits will remain the same); establish a wild hog-dog season, two 3-day hunts (quota 50, no exemptions); allow only wild hog to be hunted during the hog-dog season; no more than three free-running dogs will be allowed per quota permit, each quota permit shall allow a hunting group of two persons and a guest (three total) and only one gun may be used per hunting group; and lengthen general gun season by seven days.

Thomas Creek WMA, Kings Road Unit – clarify that the bag limit for deer and turkey is one per quota permit.

Troy Springs WMA – allow public access only from 1.5 hours before sunrise until 1.5 hours after sunset unless in possession of a Special Use Authorization from the Suwannee River Water Management District.

Twin Rivers WMA – prohibit camping except as authorized by the Division of Forestry.

Twin Rivers WMA, Blue Springs Unit – change the special-opportunity quail season to a quota quail season; establish the entire area as a quail enhancement area; allow up to eight days of quail hunting; and decrease the bag limit for quail from 12 per special-opportunity permit to six per quail quota permit.

Additional proposed rule changes would provide non-substantive technical changes, such as grammatical corrections, language standardization, or clarification of an existing rule.

Archery – September 28-30 29 through October 1 and October 5-7 6-8, only in the still hunt areas; and the Saturday before Thanksgiving and continuing for 57 days thereafter in the archery only area, which is within the area described by a line beginning at the intersection of County Road 225 and Woodbury Road, then southeast on County Road 225 to State Road 16, then south on State Road 16 and County Road 230 to the Camp Blanding boundary on the east side of County Road 230, then east along the Camp Blanding boundary to Duval Road, then south on Duval Road to Yerkes Road, then west on Yerkes Road to Treat Road, then north on Treat Road to Lightning Strike Road, then west and north on Lightning Strike Road to State Road 230, then west on State Road 230 to the Camp Blanding boundary, then north along the Camp Blanding boundary to State Road 16, then east on the south side of State Road 16 to Lightning Strike Road, then north on Lightning Strike Road to Bessent Road, then north on Bessent Road to the starting point. A disjunct portion of the archery only area is south of County Road 215, east of Rifle Range Road, north of State Road 16 and west of the Camp Blanding boundary.

6. Muzzleloading gun – October <u>12-14</u> 13-15 and <u>19-21</u> 20-22, only in the still hunt areas.

3. Possession or use of a dog, other than a dog on a leash for trailing wounded game, is prohibited except (1) in the dog hunt area and (2) bird dogs are allowed in still hunt areas 1 and 2 but only after the first 16 days of the general gun season.

5. During the spring turkey quota hunts, hunters will be assigned to a zone and may enter only that zone. Hunters may not enter the area before 5 a.m. each day and shall exit by 1 p.m. of each hunt day. During spring turkey hunts, only persons eligible for the hunt are <u>allowed permitted</u> in the area.

6. No change.

7. Only shotguns are <u>allowed</u> permitted for taking turkey during the spring turkey season.

8. through 13. No change.

14. Access to still hunt area one, still hunt area two and the dog hunt area is allowed only through Florida Fish and Wildlife <u>Conservation</u> Commission check stations 1, 2 or 3.

(2) Cypress Creek Wildlife Management Area.

(d) General regulations:

(3) Gulf Hammock Wildlife Management Area.

RULE TITLE: Specific Regulations for Wildlife Management Areas – Northwest Region

PURPOSE AND EFFECT: The purpose of the proposed rule changes is to revise specific area regulations on Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs) in the Northwest Region and conform to calendar year date changes. The effect of the proposed rule changes will be to enable the agency to better manage fish and wildlife resources and public use on WMAs.

SUMMARY: The proposed rule changes would adjust season dates to conform to calendar year changes and revise specific area regulations on Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs) in the Northwest Region as follows:

Apalachicola WMA – expand the migratory bird hunting seasons to match the statewide season; increase the number of days of quail hunting on the quail enhancement area to a maximum of eight days; decrease the bag limit for quail from 12 to six per quota permit; limit camping on Northwest Florida Water Management District lands to no more than 14 consecutive days and to tents, trailers or self-propelled camping vehicles only; and prohibit at campsites kitchen stoves, refrigerators and freezers, unless contained in mobile campers, as well as lumber, sheet metal or other building materials.

Apalachicola WMA, Bradwell Unit – establish a wild hog-dog season with five 3-day hunts (quota of three per hunt, no exemptions) and a wild hog-still season with five 3-day hunts (quota of six per hunt, no exemptions); allow only wild hog to be hunted during the wild hog seasons; allow up to two hunters and one guest, the use of no more than three free-running dogs and only one gun per quota permit during the wild hog-dog hunts; specify that wild hog-dog hunts will begin at 12:01 a.m. on the first day of the hunt and end at 11:59 p.m. (midnight) the last day of the hunt; prohibit hunting from sunrise to sunset during the wild hog-dog season; and allow wild hogs to be hunted during the wild hog-dog season by the aid of a light with a firearm, provided that the firearm is not loaded until immediately prior to shooting a bayed hog (hunting of wild hog under this provision by display or use of a light from a moving vehicle, boat or animal is prohibited).

Aucilla WMA – remove the quota permit requirement during the muzzleloading gun season; and allow public access from 1.5 hours before sunrise to 1.5 hours after sunset in the still hunt area north of Goose Pasture Road.

Blackwater WMA – expand the waterfowl season to match the statewide season; establish a quail enhancement area north of Bryant Bridge Road, east of Sandy Forest Road, east of County Road 191 between Sandy Forest Road and State Highway 4, south of State Highway 4 and west of Norman Riley Road

(approximately 18,100 acres) and allow up to eight days of quail hunting, with no more than eight quota permits (for quail) per day (no exemptions, up to two hunters per quota permit), in January and February with a bag limit of six quail per quota permit; and allow bird-dog training in the quail enhancement area from November 1 through December 31.

Box-R WMA – establish a wild hog-dog season with five 3-day hunts (quota of ten per hunt, no exemptions); allow only wild hog to be hunted during the wild hog-dog hunts; allow up to two hunters and one guest, the use of no more than three free-running dogs and only one gun per quota permit during the wild hog-dog hunts; specify that wild hog-dog hunts will begin at 12:01 a.m. on the first day of the hunt and end at 11:59 p.m. (midnight) the last day of the hunt; prohibit hunting from sunrise to sunset during the wild hog-dog season; and allow wild hogs to be hunted during the wild hog-dog season by the aid of a light with a firearm, provided that the firearm is not loaded until immediately prior to shooting a bayed hog (hunting of wild hog under this provision by display or use of a light from a moving vehicle, boat or animal is prohibited).

Choctawhatchee River WMA – limit camping to no more than 14 consecutive days; and prohibit the possession or consumption of intoxicating beverages in the Holmes Creek Unit.

Econfina Creek WMA – expand the migratory bird hunting season to match the statewide season, except in the mobility-impaired, Cat Creek and Fitzhugh Carter areas; remove those portions of the area lying in Jackson County and east of Ten-mile Creek from the dog hunt area and add them to the still hunt area; require a quota permit for the entire general gun season on the dog hunt area; allow raccoon and opossum to be taken with a gun at night with the aid of a light and dogs during the raccoon season; limit camping at designated campsites to no more than 14 consecutive days; and prohibit the use of bicycles on the Fitzhugh Carter area.

Escambia River WMA – limit camping to no more than 14 consecutive days.

Lafayette Creek WMA – expand the migratory bird hunting season to match the statewide season; and allow public access during daylight hours, except during quota hunts.

Perdido River WMA – close Shelby Ditch Road to vehicle access from May through September.

Pine Log WMA – expand the waterfowl season to match the statewide season.

Tate's Hell WMA – establish a fox, raccoon, opossum and bobcat season open from May 1 through September 30 on that portion of the area bounded by Jet Engine Road, Five Points Road, Trout Creek Road, Buck Siding Road, Tucker Road and Gully Branch Road.

Tate's Hell WMA, Womack Creek Unit – expand the waterfowl season to match the statewide season and prohibit hunting wildlife on or from the right-of-way of Jeff Sanders Road from Rock Landing Road south 1/2 mile to SFR 174.

Upper Chipola River WMA – limit camping at designated campsites to no more than 14 consecutive days.

Wakulla WMA – prohibit discharging firearms on or from the right-of-way of Chattin Road within 1/4 mile of its intersection with McBride Slough Road.

Yellow River WMA – limit camping to no more than 14 consecutive days; and allow raccoon and opossum to be taken with a gun at night with the aid of a light and dogs during the general gun and small game seasons, except in the Grassy Point and Burnt Grocery Creek areas.

Additional proposed rule changes would provide non-substantive technical changes, such as grammatical corrections, language standardization, or clarification of an existing rule.

68A-15.063 Specific Regulations for Wildlife Management Areas – Northwest Region.

(1) Apalachee Wildlife Management Area.

(a) Open season:

1. General gun – November 25-28 26-29 and December <u>11</u> 12 through February <u>13</u> 14 (Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays closed to hunting in Zones A and B, except hunting is allowed the Friday after Thanksgiving).

2. Archery – October <u>16</u> 17 through November <u>14</u> 15.

3. Fishing and frogging – Throughout the year.

4. Muzzleloading gun – November 19-21 20-22.

5. <u>Special September</u> Early duck – On Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays of the September season established by Rule 68A-13.003, F.A.C.

The bag limit for quail on the quail enhancement area is six (6) 12 per quota permit.

(d) General regulations:

<u>3.</u>4. No change.

<u>4.5.</u> Taking of wildlife by use of a gun on or from rights-of-way of State Road 267, 67, 375, 65, 299, 368, 369, 260, 373, 263, 379, 12 or that portion of County Road 22 east of the Ochlockonee River is prohibited as provided by Rule 68A-4.008, F.A.C.

5.6. No change.

<u>6.7</u>. Taking of deer is prohibited on or from the rights-of-way of State Road 375 and 50 yards outward from the rights-of-way.

8. through 9. renumbered 7. through 8. No change.

<u>9.40.</u> A quota permit, as established annually by Order of the Executive Director or designee, shall be required for each group entering the quail enhancement area to take quail. Up to two (2) quota permits may be issued per day and up to two (2) hunters will be allowed per permit. The number of Saturdays open for quail hunting will be adjusted each year as necessary so as not to exceed to achieve a harvest of up to 15% of the fall population, based on <u>annual fall an October</u> quail surveys.

<u>10.11.</u> No change.

(3) Apalachicola Wildlife Management Area – Bradwell Unit.

(a) Open season:

1. General gun – November 25-28 26-29 and December 11-15 12-16.

2. Archery – October $\underline{16-22}$ $\underline{17-23}$ and October $\underline{23-31}$ $\underline{24}$ through November 1.

3. Muzzleloading gun – November <u>19-21</u> 20-22.

4. Small game – November $\underline{13-14}$ $\underline{14}$ $\underline{15}$ and December $\underline{18}$ $\underline{19}$ through January $\underline{2}$ $\underline{3}$.

5. Spring turkey – March <u>19-20</u> 20-21 and April <u>1-3</u> 2-4.

During the family still hunt, any deer (bag limit of three per quota permit) may be taken except spotted fawns. Taking quail is prohibited on the field trial area and the quail enhancement area (that portion of the area lying north of Bryant Bridge Road, east of Sandy Forest Road, east of County Road 191 between Sandy Forest Road and State Highway 4, south of State Highway 4 and west of Norman Riley Road) except by quail permit during the quail seasons season. The bag limit for quail on the field trial area is 12 per hunting group each day. A group for the purpose of quail hunting on the field trial area shall include up to 2 persons. The number of days open for quail hunting will be adjusted each year as necessary so as not to exceed a harvest of 15% of the fall population, based on annual fall quail surveys.

(5) Blackwater Wildlife Management Area – Hutton Unit.(a) Open season:

1. Archery – October <u>16-19</u> 17-20 and <u>20-24</u> 21-25.

2. Muzzleloading gun – November 19-21 20-22.

3. Quail – November <u>13-14</u> <u>14-15</u>, <u>24-25</u> <u>25-26</u>, December <u>4-5</u> <u>5-6</u>, <u>13-14</u> <u>14-15</u>, <u>18-19</u> <u>19-20</u>, <u>27-28</u> <u>28-29</u> and January <u>1-2</u> 2-3.

4. General gun – January <u>15-18</u> 16-19 and <u>19-23</u> 20-24.

5. Mobility-impaired general gun – January <u>28-30</u> 29-31 and February <u>4-6</u> 5-7.

6. Spring turkey – March <u>19-21</u> 20-22, April <u>1-3</u> 2-4 and April <u>15-17</u> 16-18.

(b) Legal to take: All legal game, fish, frogs and furbearers except that only quail may be taken during the quail season. Taking quail is prohibited except during the quail season. Taking of antlered deer not having at least one antler with three or more points, one inch or more in length, is prohibited. The bag limit for antlered deer shall be one per quota hunt permit, except during the mobility-impaired hunts. Two deer (except spotted fawns) may be taken per mobility-impaired quota hunt permit. During the general gun for mobility-impaired season, only mobility-impaired hunters may take antlerless deer. During periods open to hunting in the mobility-impaired hunt area, vehicles may be operated only by persons possessing a mobility-impaired quota permit or their guests guest. During periods closed to hunting, vehicular access is prohibited on Dog <u>R</u>+roads 1-8, 10, 13-17, 19, 20-28 and 33-37, Enfinger Road and <u>on numbered roads</u> in the mobility-impaired area.

2. Taking wildlife with dogs, other than bird dogs or retrievers, is prohibited <u>in Jackson County and areas</u> west of State Road 77, south of State Road 20, east of Econfina Creek, <u>east of Ten-mile Creek</u>, west of Econfina Road and south of Greenhead Road, and north of Duma Jack Road except that dogs may be used to take raccoons (except in the mobility-impaired hunt area).

PURPOSE AND EFFECT: The purpose of the proposed rule changes is to revise specific area regulations on Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs) in the South Region and conform to calendar year date changes. The effect of the proposed rule changes will be to enable the agency to better manage fish and wildlife resources and public use on WMAs.

SUMMARY: The proposed rule changes would adjust season dates to conform to calendar year changes and revise specific area regulations on Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs) in the South Region as follows:

Allapattah Flats WMA – Trails will be open to vehicular access one week prior to the start of archery and spring turkey seasons through 6 p.m. one day after the close of archery and spring turkey seasons and during dove, waterfowl, and snipe seasons; begin the general gun hunt on the Saturday following the family hunt; change the archery season from a 7-day and 9-day hunt to four 4-day hunts (quota 50, no exemptions); and bird dogs and retrievers may be used to hunt migratory game during the migratory bird seasons. Dinner Island Ranch WMA – Change wild hog bag limit from one per quota permit to daily bag of one, possession limit of two, no size limit and allow them to be taken the entire month of February; move the family hunt from the second and third weekends in November to the first and second weekends in December; change the archery season from two consecutive hunts (7-day and 9-day) to four 4-day hunts (quota 45, no exemptions); change the general gun season from two consecutive hunts (4-day and 5-day) to three 3-day hunts (quota 45, no exemptions); change the spring turkey season

(quota 45, no exemptions); change the spring turkey season from two consecutive hunts (4-day and 5-day) to three 3-day hunts (quota 20, no exemptions); allow migratory birds to be taken during statewide open seasons; bird dogs and retrievers may be used to hunt small game during migratory bird and small game seasons; and allow year-round public vehicle access on trails currently only open for seasonal vehicle access by people participating in hunts.

Everglades and Francis S. Taylor WMA – Remove the annual bag limit and shoulder height restriction for wild hogs; establish a possession limit of two for wild hogs; add an additional week to the general gun-walk hunt in conservation Areas 3A North and 2 and shorten the muzzleloading gun season in Conservation Area 3A North by one week; eliminate the second general gun-walk hunt; remove language that prohibits kitchen stoves, refrigerators and freezers unless contained in mobile campers or an existing permanent camp; prohibit operation of airboats during legal shooting hours during archery, muzzleloading and general gun-walk seasons; and allow use of tracked vehicles by persons participating in alligator hunts.

Holey Land WMA – Remove the annual bag limit and shoulder height restriction for wild hogs; establish a possession limit of two for wild hogs; add an additional week to the general gun-walk hunt and shorten the muzzleloading gun season by one week; and allow the use of tracked vehicles by persons participating in alligator hunts.

J.W. Corbett WMA - Allow wild hog to be hunted for the entire general gun season; change the bag limit for wild hog from one annually to one per day, two annually; remove the shoulder height restriction for wild hog; remove the quota permit requirement for the first nine days of general gun season; restrict dog training during the dog training season to the area south and east of Stumper's Grade; public vehicle access is allowed on the North, South, and Stumper's Grade and Trail 6 when the area is open to public access; during archery and spring turkey seasons allow only those persons participating in the hunt vehicle access on named and numbered trails; during the muzzleloading gun, general gun, and small game seasons allow only those persons participating in the hunt cross-country vehicle access; allow the possession of alcohol on selected roads and consumption of alcohol in selected campgrounds; and adjust the boundary for the buffer zone adjacent to the Pratt-Whitney complex.

Okaloacoochee Slough WMA – expand waterfowl season to match statewide dates; and allow bird dogs and retrievers for the take of small game.

Rotenberger WMA – Remove the annual bag limit and shoulder height restriction for wild hogs; establish a possession limit of two for wild hogs; remove language that prohibits kitchen stoves, refrigerators and freezers unless contained in mobile campers or an existing permanent camp; add an additional week to the general gun-walk hunt and shorten the muzzleloading gun season by one week; and allow the use of tracked vehicles and airboats by persons participating in alligator hunts.

Spirit-of-the-Wild WMA – Change wild hog bag limit from one per quota permit to daily bag of one, possession of two, no size limit and allow them to be taken the entire month of February; change the archery season from two consecutive hunts (7-day and 9-day) to four 4-day hunts (quota 20, no exemptions); change the general gun season from two consecutive hunts (4-day and 5-day) to three 3-day hunts (quota 20, no exemptions); change the spring turkey season from two consecutive hunts (4-day and 5-day) to three 3-day hunts (quota 10, no exemptions); allow migratory birds to be taken during statewide open seasons; and bird dogs and retrievers may be used to hunt small game during migratory bird and small game seasons.

Additional proposed rule changes would provide non-substantive technical changes, such as grammatical corrections, language standardization, or clarification of an existing rule.

68A-15.064 Specific Regulations for Wildlife Management Areas – South Region.

(1) J. W. Corbett Wildlife Management Area.

(a) No change.

(b) Legal to take: All legal game, fish, furbearers and frogs. Deer daily bag one, annual bag two; wild hog <u>daily bag</u> <u>one</u>, annual bag <u>two</u> one. The take of wild hog with a shoulder height of less than 20 inches is prohibited. The take of wild hog is prohibited after the first nine days of the general gun season and during small game season. Turkeys may not be taken during the archery season.

(c) No change.

(d) General regulations:

1. The use of rifles is prohibited <u>within the Pratt-Whitney</u> <u>buffer zone and</u> within one-fourth mile of the Seaboard Coastline Railroad, the Pratt Whitney fence and Mecca Farms. The use of centerfire rifles is prohibited south and east of Stumper's Grade.

2. The use or possession of airboats, tracked vehicles, <u>unlicensed</u> and <u>unregistered</u> motorcycles motorized two-wheeled vehicles or all-terrain vehicles on the area is prohibited.

3. No change.

4. During open periods other than designated hunting seasons, vehicles may only be operated on named or numbered roads and Trail 6. From 8 a.m. one day before the opening of archery season through the close of the archery season and during spring turkey season, vehicles may be operated only on named or numbered roads or trails, but only by persons participating in the hunts, and on named or numbered roads. Vehicles may only be operated on named or numbered roads and Trail 6 at any time after 8 a.m. one day prior to muzzleloading gun, general gun and small game seasons through the last day of each of these seasons, except these restrictions shall not apply to persons participating in the hunts.

5. During dog training season and open periods other than designated hunting seasons, motorized vehicles may be operated only on the North, South, and Stumper's grades, on Trail 6, on Trail 3 between its junction with Tomato Field Grade and its junction with Trail 5, on Trail 5 between its junction with Trail 3 and the L-8 levee, and on the Tomato Field grade east of the Big Gopher canal. These vehicle access prohibitions shall not apply from 8:00 a.m. one day before the opening of muzzleloading gun and general gun seasons through the close of muzzleloading gun and general gun seasons.

6. through 8. renumbered 5. through 7. No change.

<u>8.9.</u> Deer dogs and bird dogs may be trained <u>only in that</u> portion of the area south and east of Stumper's Grade and only beginning 14 days prior to the opening of the general gun season and ending 5 days prior to the opening of the general gun season. Taking wildlife with guns is prohibited while training dogs.

10. through 11. renumbered 9. through 10. No change.

<u>11.12.</u> The possession or consumption of <u>alcoholic</u> intoxicating beverages is prohibited <u>except they may be</u> transported to the extent that Section 316.1936, Florida Statutes, allows only on the North South and Stumper's grades, and may only be consumed at designated campsites other than <u>Camp O</u>.

13. through 19. renumbered 12. through 18. No change.

(2) Holey Land Wildlife Management Area.

(a) Open season:

1. General gun – Walk, October <u>16-31</u> 24 through November 1.

2. General gun – Vehicle, November <u>6-21</u> 7-22 (tracked vehicles). Deer hunting by quota permit only during the general gun-vehicle season.

3. Archery – August <u>28</u> 29 through September <u>19</u> 20.

4. Muzzleloading gun – October 2-10 3-18.

5. Small game – November 22 23 through March 67.

6. Migratory game birds – Migratory game birds except crows, mourning dove and white-winged dove during seasons established by Rules 68A-13.003 and 68A-13.008, F.A.C.

The take of wild hog is prohibited during small game season. During the general gun-vehicle season, a bag limit for antlered deer shall be one during archery season, one during muzzleloading gun season, one during general gun-vehicle season.

(c) Camping – Only tents, trailers or self-propelled camping vehicles may be used for camping. Camps may not be set up in the area prior to <u>seven</u> 7 days before archery season and all vehicles, camps, tents, other camping equipment and litter must be removed no later than 6:00 p.m. <u>seven</u> 7 days after the close of the general gun season. The erection of any permanent structure is prohibited. During the remainder of the

year, camping is allowed on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays only, but campsites may not be left unattended for more than 24 hours. Camping is allowed only on the L-5 Levee and the Miami Canal Levee.

(d) No change.

(e) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this subsection, alligator hunt participants may operate airboats and tracked vehicles throughout the area when taking alligators.

(3) Everglades and Francis S. Taylor Wildlife Management Area.

(a) Open season:

1. General gun – Walk, October <u>16-31</u> 24 through November 1 Conservation Areas 3A North and 2 only. December 5 through January 3 in that portion of the area between the Old Miami Canal (Mud Canal) and the New Miami Canal in Conservation Area 3A North only.

2. General gun – Vehicle (airboats and tracked vehicles only), November <u>6-21</u> 7-22, in Conservation Areas 3A North, 3A South, 2, and the Francis S. Taylor Wildlife Management Area by permit only.

3. Archery – August 28 29 through September 19 20, Conservation Area 3A North only.

4. Muzzleloading gun – October 2-10 3-18, in Conservation Area 3A North only.

5. Small game – November $\underline{22}$ $\underline{23}$ though March $\underline{6}$ 7.

6. through 7. No change.

(b) Legal to take: All legal game (except turkeys), fish, frogs and furbearers. Taking of antlered deer not having at least one forked antler and having one or more antlers at least 5 inches in length visible above the hairline is prohibited. The forked antler shall have at least two points one inch or greater in length. Take of antlerless deer is prohibited during archery season. The bag limit for wild hog shall be one per day, possession limit two and two annually. During the general gun-vehicle season, a bag limit of one wild hog per day per vehicle shall apply. The take of wild hog with a shoulder height of less than 15 inches is prohibited. The take of wild hog is prohibited during small game season. The bag limit for antlered deer shall be one per season during archery, muzzleloading gun and general gun-walk seasons and one per tag during the general gun-vehicle season.

(c) Camping: Only tents, trailers or self-propelled camping vehicles may be used for camping. Camps may not be set up in the area prior to 7 days before archery season and all vehicles, camps, tents, other camping equipment and litter must be removed no later than 6 p.m. seven days after the close of the general gun season. Kitchen stoves, refrigerators, and freezers, unless contained in mobile campers or an existing permanent eamp, are prohibited. The erection of any permanent structure is prohibited. Camping during the period from <u>eight</u> 8 days following the close of the general gun season to <u>eight</u> 8 days prior to the archery season is allowed but only on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays and camps may not be left unattended for more than 24 hours during this period. Overnight camping is prohibited in areas posted as closed to camping.

(d) General regulations:

1. No change.

2. Vehicles and airboats are prohibited on tree islands, wildlife islands and tree strands. Vehicles and airboats are prohibited in that portion of the area between the Old Miami Canal (Mud Canal) and the New Miami Canal.

3. During the archery, muzzleloading gun and general gun-walk seasons, all-terrain vehicles are allowed but only for the purpose of hunting. All other vehicles are prohibited except vehicles are allowed on levees and during the second general gun walk season, other vehicles and vessels are allowed in Conservation Area 3A North outside of that portion of the area between the Old Miami Canal (Mud Canal) and the New Miami-Canal. All-terrain vehicle access for scouting shall be allowed two weeks prior to the archery season and one week prior to the muzzleloading gun and general gun-walk seasons. During the remainder of the year, all-terrain vehicles are prohibited. While an all-terrain vehicle is in motion, no person shall occupy any platform or structure attached thereto. No all-terrain vehicle may be equipped with a steering mechanism that would enable the all-terrain vehicle to be operated from a platform or structure attached thereto.

5. During archery, and muzzleloading gun and general gun-walk seasons and the first general gun-walk season, the operation of airboats is are prohibited in Conservation Area 3A North and Conservation Area 2 during legal shooting hours. Archery equipment, muzzleloading guns, and guns may be transported on boats (other than airboats) and all-terrain vehicles in Conservation Area 3A North and Conservation Area 2 during the archery and muzzleloading gun seasons and the first general gun-walk season, respectively.

(4) Rotenberger Wildlife Management Area.

The erection of any permanent structure is prohibited. Camping during the period from <u>eight 8</u> days following the close of the general gun season to <u>eight 8</u> days prior to the archery season is allowed but only on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays, and camps may not be left unattended for more than 24 hours during this period.

(e) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this subsection, alligator hunt participants may operate airboats and tracked vehicles throughout the area when taking alligators.

1. Hunting with dogs is prohibited except bird dogs and retrievers may be used during small game season <u>for taking small game</u>.

PURPOSE AND EFFECT: The purpose of the proposed rule changes is to revise specific area regulations on Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs) in the Northeast Region and conform to calendar year date changes. The effect of the proposed rule changes will be to enable the agency to better manage fish and wildlife resources and public use on WMAs.

SUMMARY: The proposed rule changes would adjust season dates to conform to calendar year changes and revise specific area regulations on Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs) in the Northeast Region as follows:

Buck Lake WMA – clarify that the deer bag limit is one antlered deer and one antlerless deer per quota permit.

Bull Creek WMA – allow small game to be hunted with bird dogs during all seasons except spring turkey; remove the quota permit requirement for the second and third general gun hunts.

Caravelle Ranch WMA – reduce the quota for the special-opportunity dove hunts from 80 to 60; clarify that the bag limit during spring turkey season is one gobbler or bearded turkey per quota permit.

Charles H. Bronson WMA (NEW) - 9,242 acres - establish a new wildlife management area with the following open seasons: archery - one 7-day hunt and one 9-day hunt (quota of 30 per hunt, no exemptions); muzzleloading gun – one 3-day hunt (quota of 30; no exemptions); general gun – three 3-day hunts (quota of 30 per hunt; no exemptions); small game - one 9-day hunt and one 7-day hunt (no quota permit required); spring turkey – three 3-day hunts (quota of 15 per hunt; no exemptions); statewide waterfowl and snipe seasons (no quota permit required, except during archery, muzzleloading gun or general gun hunts); fishing and frogging - year round; legal to take – all legal game, fish, frogs and furbearers; the bag limit for deer shall be one per quota permit; during the spring turkey season, the bag limit shall be one gobbler or bearded turkey per quota permit; allow camping only as authorized by the Division of Forestry; prohibit hunting with dogs other than bird dogs or retrievers for hunting small game; allow vehicles to be operated on named and numbered roads only and to be parked within 25 feet of a named or numbered road; allow vehicle access only by persons participating in the hunts; prohibit airboats, tracked vehicles, all-terrain vehicles, swamp buggies and unlicensed and unregistered motorcycles; require persons to enter and exit at a designated entrance or from any point along the St. Johns River, except access along the river is

prohibited during quota hunts and the small game season; vehicle access is allowed only during quota hunts and small game season; prohibit the use of centerfire rifles during spring turkey season and allow horses to be ridden only on designated equestrian trails.

Etoniah Creek WMA – clarify that the bag limit during spring turkey season is one gobbler or bearded turkey per quota permit.

Fort Drum WMA – convert the special-opportunity wild hog-still hunts to regular quota hunts.

Half Moon WMA – increase the wild hog-still hunts from two 2-day hunts to three 3-day hunts (quota of 50 per hunt, no exemptions).

Little Big Econlockhatchee WMA, Kilbee Unit - remove "Kilbee Unit" from the WMA name; extend the archery season from two 3-day hunts to one 7-day hunt and one 9-day hunt (increase the quota from 10 to 20 per hunt, no exemptions); increase the quota for muzzleloading gun season from 10 to 20 (no exemptions); extend the general gun season from one 3-day hunt to three 3-day hunts (increase the quota from 10 to 20 per hunt; no exemptions); remove the general gun hog season; increase small game season from three 2-day weekend hunts to 16 consecutive days (no quota permit required); allow the take of wild hog during small game season; add three 3-day spring turkey hunts (quota of 10, no exemptions); remove the requirement for hunters to check in and out at a check station upon entry and exit from the WMA; remove the requirement for hunters to record all game taken; require vehicles to be parked within 25 feet of a named or numbered road; remove the prohibition on dismemberment of deer, turkey and wild hog prior to being checked at a check station; prohibit the use of centerfire rifles for taking wild turkey during the spring turkey season.

Lake Panasoffkee WMA – allow horses only during periods closed to hunting; allow camping and hunting equipment only during periods when scouting and hunting are allowed; prohibit the take of hog during small game season; increase the number of daily quota permits issued at the check station during small game season from 30 to 40 per day (no exemptions); increase the quota for the wild hog-still hunt from 30 to 50 (no exemptions); increase the quota for the wild hog-dog hunt from 30 to 35 (no exemptions).

Marshall Swamp WMA (NEW) – 5,361 acres – establish a new wildlife management area with the following open seasons: archery – four 7-day hunts and one 9-day hunt (quota of 10 per hunt, no exemptions); muzzleloading gun – one 3-day hunt (quota of 10, no exemptions); general gun – three 3-day hunts (quota of 10 per hunt, no exemptions); small game – 114 days (no quota permit required, except when overlapping with general gun season); spring turkey – three 3-day hunts (quota of 5 per hunt; no exemptions); statewide migratory bird seasons (no quota permit required, except during archery, muzzleloading gun or general gun quota periods); fishing and frogging – year round; legal to take - all legal game, fish, frogs and furbearers; the bag limit for deer shall be one per quota permit; during the spring turkey season, the bag limit shall be one gobbler or bearded turkey per quota permit; prohibit camping; prohibit hunting with dogs other than bird dogs or retrievers for the take of small game; prohibit the take of wild hog with dogs; allow vehicles in designated parking areas only; prohibit airboats, tracked vehicles, all-terrain vehicles, swamp buggies and unlicensed and unregistered motorcycles; require persons to enter and exit at a designated entrance; prohibit the take of wildlife with centerfire rifles and centerfire handguns; prohibit fires.

Ocala WMA – remove the quota permit requirement for the general gun and muzzleloading gun hunts on the Hopkins Prairie and Lake Delancy Units; incorporate that portion of the Pipeline Unit north of the Fore Lake campground, west of CR 314 and north of US 40 into the Church Lake Unit (approximately 2700 acres), which will reduce the number of deer dog hunting days from in that area, and increase the quota for the general gun dog and general gun still hunts from 225 to 250 per hunt.

Ocklawaha River WMA, Gores Landing Unit – clarify that the deer bag limit is one per quota permit; clarify that the bag limit during spring turkey season is one gobbler or bearded turkey per quota permit.

Relay WMA – require all persons to enter and exit at a designated entrance.

Richloam – clarify that camping is allowed only as authorized by the Division of Forestry.

Richloam WMA, Baird Unit – clarify that the bag limit is one antlered and one antlerless deer per quota permit during the archery season and one antlered deer per quota permit during the muzzleloading gun and general gun seasons; and require a quota permit to hunt during the third archery hunt.

Salt Lake WMA – change the small game season from one 16-day season in December (Saturday through Sunday) to six 3-day hunts (Friday through Sunday) during December, January and February; clarify that the deer bag limit is one per quota permit.

Seminole Forest WMA, Lake Tracy Unit – add one 3-day archery hunt (quota 40, no exemptions); add three 3-day wild hog-still hunts (quota 40, no exemptions); increase the quotas for archery, muzzleloading gun and general gun seasons from 20 to 40 per hunt (no exemptions), and for spring turkey season from 10 to 20 per hunt (no exemptions); change the bag limit from two deer per day to two deer per quota permit; allow vehicles to be parked within 25 feet of a named or numbered road.

Seminole Ranch WMA – increase the length of the muzzleloading gun hunts from 2 days to 3 days; clarify that the deer bag limit is one per quota permit.

Three Lakes WMA – establish a quail enhancement area east of the Florida Turnpike and west of U.S. 441 (25,168 acres) and allow up to 8 days of quail hunting, with no more than 10 quota permits per day (no exemptions, up to two hunters per quota permit) in January and February, with a bag limit of 6 quail per quota permit; remove the quota requirement for the second and third general gun hunts and the general gun for mobility impaired hunt; allow raccoon hunting on that area between the Florida Turnpike and U.S. 441 only.

Three Lakes WMA, Prairie Lakes Unit – expand the snipe and dove seasons to match the statewide seasons.

Tiger Bay WMA, Rima Ridge Unit – allow vehicles only on named and numbered roads designated on the hunt map; clarify that the deer bag limit is one per quota permit.

Tosohatchee WMA – allow turkey to be hunted during archery season; issue quota permits for the Monday through Thursday wild hog-dog hunts first-come, first-served at the check station. Twelve Mile Swamp WMA – require all persons to enter and exit at a designated entrance; reduce the number of recreational user permits issued from 200 to 125.

Upper St. Johns River Marsh WMA – allow motorized vessels in areas posted as seasonal walk-in areas, but only from one day following the close of spring turkey season to one day prior to archery season.

Additional proposed rule changes would provide non-substantive technical changes, such as grammatical corrections, language standardization or clarification of an existing rule.

68A-15.065 Specific Regulations for Wildlife Management Areas – Northeast Region.

(1) Bull Creek Wildlife Management Area.

(a) Open season:

1. General gun – November <u>13-14 and November 15</u> <u>through January 9</u> 14-15, 16-18, 19-22 and November 23 <u>through January 10</u>.

2. Small game – January <u>10</u> 11 through March <u>6</u> 7.

3. Spring turkey – March 19 20 through April 24 25.

4. Archery – September 25-26 26-27 and September 27 28 through October 24 25. An archery/muzzleloading gun quota permit will be required for the September 26-27 hunt.

5. Muzzleloading gun – October <u>29-31</u> 30 through November 1.

6. No change.

(b) Legal to take: All legal game, fish, frogs and furbearers (except bobcat and otter). Any deer except spotted fawns may be taken during the archery season. During the muzzleloading gun and general gun seasons, antlerless deer may be taken by permit only. Taking of antlered deer not having at least one antler with three or more points, one inch or more in length, is prohibited. Taking wild hog is prohibited during small game season.

(c) Camping: Allowed only at designated campgrounds during periods in which hunting is allowed and throughout the year at designated campsites on the Florida National Scenic Trail provided that access to area is via the Trail. Camping equipment may be taken onto the area <u>no earlier than after 8</u> a.m. seven days prior to the opening of archery season and shall be removed from the area before 6 p.m. seven days following the end of the spring turkey season. Camping shall be allowed from 8 a.m. one day prior to each season through 6 p.m. one day following each season. Only tents, trailers or self-propelled camping vehicles may be used for camping. <u>The</u> <u>name, address and telephone number of the person responsible</u> <u>for each campsite shall be visibly affixed to camping shelters.</u>

(d) General regulations:

1. Persons hunting on the Crabgrass Creek portion of the area shall have a daily permit issued from the check station in their possession (except during the small game season) and shall enter and exit at \underline{a} the designated entrance point on Crabgrass Road.

2. No change.

3. Hunters shall check in and out at a check station when entering and exiting the area and shall check all game taken, except during the small game season when hunters shall check in and out using self-check boxes located at each designated entrance and record all game taken. Persons engaging in recreational activities other than hunting shall register at the check station upon entering and exiting the area.

4. No change.

5. <u>Motorcycles</u>, <u>A</u>airboats, <u>or</u> tracked vehicles <u>and</u> <u>unlicensed and unregistered motorcycles</u> are prohibited.

6. The name, address and telephone number of the person responsible for each campsite shall be visibly affixed to camping shelters.

6.7. No change.

<u>7.8.</u> Hunting with dogs is prohibited except that bird dogs are allowed <u>for taking small game</u> during the general gun and small game seasons.

(2) Fort Ft. McCoy Wildlife Management Area.

(a) Open season:

1. General gun – November 13 14 through January 9 10.

2. Small game – January 10-30 11-31.

3. Archery – September 25 26 through October 24 25.

4. Muzzleloading gun – October 30 31 through November 7 8.

5. Spring turkey – March 19 20 through April 24 25.

6. Fishing and frogging - <u>Allowed</u> <u>Permitted</u> during periods in which <u>access hunting</u> is allowed.

(b) through (c) No change.

(d) General regulations:

1. through 3. No change.

4. Access to the area is <u>allowed</u> permitted only from the Saturday two weeks prior to the archery season through the last day of the spring turkey season.

5. through 6. No change..

7. Access is <u>allowed</u> permitted only by individuals possessing a valid recreational <u>use</u> user permit, except as provided by Section 372.57, F.S.

(3) Ocala Wildlife Management Area.

(a) Open season:

1. General gun – November $\underline{13}$ 14 through January $\underline{9}$ 10 (Church Lake Unit – first 9 days only).

2. General gun still – November 27 28 through December 5 6 (Church Lake Unit only).

3. Small game – January $\underline{10}$ $\underline{11}$ through March $\underline{6}$ 7.

4. Archery – September 25 26 through October 24 25.

5. Muzzleloading gun – October <u>29-31</u> 30 through November 1, on the Church Lake, Hopkins Prairie and Lake Delancy Management Units only.

6. Fox, <u>opossum</u>, bobcat and raccoon – November $\underline{13}$ $\underline{14}$ through April $\underline{17}$ $\underline{18}$.

7. <u>Special September</u> Early duck – In the <u>special</u> September <u>duck</u> season established by Rule 68A-13.003, F.A.C.

8. Spring turkey – March <u>24-27</u> 25-28, <u>March 31 through</u> April <u>3</u> 1 4, <u>7-10</u> 8 11 and <u>14-17</u> 15 18.

<u>9. Dove – During the mourning dove and white-winged</u> dove season established by Rule 68A-13.008, F.A.C.

<u>10.9</u>. Trapping – December 1 through March 1, except in that portion of the Pipeline Management Unit south of S.R. 40, east of County Road 183 AV, and west of S.R. 19.

<u>11.10.</u> No change..

(b) Legal to take:

1. All legal game (except antlerless deer), fish, frogs and furbearers. During the spring turkey season the bag limit shall be one gobbler or bearded turkey per quota hunt permit. Antlered deer may only be taken in the Church Lake Unit during the archery season, muzzleloading gun season, the first 9 days of the general gun season and the general gun still season. Deer daily bag one, no season bag.

2. Furbearing animals – During the November <u>13</u> <u>14</u> through March 1 period, hunting as specified in paragraph 68A-24.002(2)(b), F.A.C., is <u>allowed permitted</u> only in the Pipeline and Church Lake Management Units. Raccoons may also be hunted, with dogs only, from March <u>7</u> 8 through April <u>17</u> 18 only in that portion of the Pipeline Management Unit south of S.R. 40, east of County Road 183 AV, and west of S.R. 19. The hunting of fox and bobcat by the use of dogs only shall be <u>allowed permitted</u> from January <u>10</u> 11 through April <u>17</u> 18, only in that portion of the Pipeline Management Unit south of S.R. 40, east of County Road 183 AV, and west of S.R. 19.

(c) Camping: Throughout the year. <u>Camping is allowed by</u> the use of tents, trailers or self-propelled camping vehicles only on designated campsites during the general gun season.

(d) General regulations:

1. Camping is permitted by the use of tents, trailers, or self propelled camping vehicles only on designated campsites during the general gun season.

1.2. No deer or turkey shall be dismembered or transported out of the hunt area until checked at a check station.

3. All management units will be open for the taking of doves during all phases of the dove season.

<u>2.4</u>. Hunting with dogs is prohibited in the Hopkins Prairie and Lake Delancy management units, except bird dogs and retrievers are allowed during small game, <u>special September</u> early duck, dove, and duck, <u>geese</u> and coot seasons. Taking deer with dogs is prohibited in the Church Lake Unit during the general gun still hunt. Caged or leashed hunting dogs may be transported on <u>established</u> numbered roads.

<u>3.5.</u> Taking of wildlife by use of a gun on or from rights-of-way of all paved roads, Forest Road <u>69</u> 538 from State Road 42 to County Road 445, Forest Road <u>14</u> 573, Forest Road <u>13</u> 588, Blue Creek Lodge Road, Deerhaven Road, North Boulevard, Forest Road <u>46</u> 10 east of Forest Road <u>33</u> 65,

Forest Road <u>33</u> 65 south of Forest Road <u>46</u> 10, Forest Road <u>05</u> 79 south of Forest Road <u>38</u> 76 or that portion of any road adjacent to posted lands, and all Forest Service, and county and state roads in the Church Lake is prohibited as provided by Rule 68A-4.008, F.A.C.

<u>6.8.</u> Dogs may be used to pursue rabbits from January <u>10</u> <u>11</u> through April <u>17</u> 18 in that portion of the Pipeline Management Unit south of S.R. 40, east of County Road 183 AV, and west of S.R. 19.

(e) The Ocala Wildlife Management Area consists of four management units described as follows:

2. Spring turkey – March <u>19-27</u> 20-28 and March <u>28</u> 29 through April <u>24</u> 25.

3. Archery – September 25 26 through October 24 25.

4. No change.

5. Trapping – January <u>10</u> 11 through March 1.

6. Wild General gun hog-dog - January 11-13 12-14.

(b) Legal to take: All legal game (except antlerless deer), fish, frogs and furbearers. Only wild hog may be taken during the <u>wild general gun</u> hog-dog season.

(c) Camping: <u>Prohibited unless authorized by the Division</u> <u>of Forestry.</u> Permitted at designated campsites.

(d) General regulations:

1. All persons shall enter <u>and</u> or exit the area at designated entrances.

2. Only tents, trailers, temporary shelters and self-propelled camping vehicles may be used for camping.

3. through 5. renumbered 2. through 4. No change.

6. During archery and spring turkey season camping is permitted only at Pless Place campsite.

<u>5.7.</u> The taking of wild hog by the use of dogs is prohibited, except during the <u>wild general gun</u> hog-dog season.

<u>6.8.</u> Persons licensed to use trapping devices Licensed trappers may possess a .22 caliber rimfire <u>firearm other than</u> .22 magnum rifle or pistol during the trapping season provided that no such firearm shall be loaded at any time except immediately prior to the shooting of a trapped furbearer.

<u>9. Hunting raccoon and opossum as specified in paragraph</u> <u>68A-24.002(2)(b), F.A.C., is allowed only during the general</u> <u>gun, wild hog-dog and trapping seasons.</u>

11. Camping equipment may not be taken into the area prior to 14 days before each hunting season and shall be removed by 6 p.m. six days after the close of each hunting season.

(6) Three Lakes Wildlife Management Area.

(a) Open season:

1. General gun – November <u>13-14 and November 15</u> <u>through January 9</u> 14-15, 16-18, 19-22 and November 23 <u>through January 10</u>.

2. Small game – January <u>10</u> 11 through March <u>6</u> 7.

3. Spring turkey – March 19 20 through April 24 25.

4. Archery – September 25-26 26-27 and September 27 28 through October 24 25.

5. <u>Special September Early</u> duck – In the <u>special</u> September <u>duck</u> season established by Rule 68A-13.003, F.A.C., in that area between Prairie Lakes Unit and Canoe Creek Road only.

6. Muzzleloading gun – October <u>29-31</u> 30 through November 1.

7. General gun for mobility impaired -_November 5-76-8.

8. General gun-dog – December 9-12 10-13 and December 30 31 through January 2 3 in that area between the Florida Turnpike and U.S. 441 only.

The take of wild hog is prohibited during small game season and general-gun dog season. <u>Killing quail is prohibited on the quail enhancement area (that portion of the area lying east of the Florida Turnpike) except by quail permit during the quail season. The bag limit for quail on the quail enhancement area is six (6) per quota permit.</u>

(c) Camping: <u>Allowed Permitted</u> only at designated hunter campsites during the periods in which hunting is allowed and at designated campsites on the Florida Trail throughout the year. Camping equipment may be taken onto the area <u>no earlier</u> <u>than after 8 8:00</u> a.m. seven days prior to the opening of archery season and shall be removed from the area before <u>6</u> 6:00 p.m. seven days following the end of the spring turkey season. During the first two days of archery season, the muzzleloading gun season and the general gun seasons, except the general gun-dog and general gun for mobility impaired seasons hunts, the quota of hunters will be admitted daily as follows: U.S. 441 check station – 375; Canoe Creek check station – 50; State Road 60 check station – 200. During the general gun-dog hunts, the quota of hunters for the 441 check station will be 100 by quota permit east of the Florida Turnpike and 100 daily permits issued at the check station for west of the Florida Turnpike.

2. Only tents, trailers and self-propelled camping vehicles may be used for camping.

<u>4.5.</u> Hunting with dogs other than bird dogs is prohibited except during the general gun-dog hunts when dogs with a shoulder height of 17 inches or less may be used for deer hunting east of the Florida Turnpike <u>during the general gun-dog season; dogs with a shoulder height of 15 inches or less may be used during the small game season; and dogs of any size may be used to hunt raccoon during the raccoon season.</u>

6. Fishing and frogging - <u>Allowed</u> Permitted throughout the year.

7. <u>Wild hog-still</u> General gun hog – December 3-5 4-6 and January 7-9 8-10.

<u>8. Dove – During the mourning dove and white-winged</u> <u>dove season established by Rule 68A-13.008, F.A.C.</u>

<u>9. Snipe – During the snipe season established by Rule</u> <u>68A-13.008, F.A.C.</u>

(b) Legal to take: All legal game, fish, frogs and furbearers. During the archery, muzzleloading gun and general gun seasons, antlerless deer may be taken by <u>antlerless deer</u> permit only. Chinsegut WEA – clarify that public access is limited to foot traffic unless participating in Commission sponsored activities; allow public access from 0.5 hours before sunrise until 0.5 hours after sunset; prohibit the possession of any animal; and require persons to enter and exit at designated entrances.

Crooked Lake Mitigation Park (NEW) 1,147 acres – prohibit the possession of any animal; limit public access to foot traffic; require persons to enter and exit at designated entrances; and allow public access from 0.5 hours before sunrise until 0.5 hours after sunset.

Hickey Creek Mitigation Park – require persons to enter and exit at designated entrances.

Janet Butterfield Brooks Mitigation Park (NEW) 319 acres – prohibit public access as required by the acquisition agreement. Lake Wales Ridge WEA – prohibit the possession of any animal, except dogs under physical restraint are allowed and horses are allowed by permit; limit public access to foot traffic, bicycle or horses; require persons to enter and exit at designated entrances; and allow public access from 0.5 hours before sunrise until 0.5 hours after sunset.

Lake Wales Ridge WEA, Royce Unit – move the wild hog-still hunt dates from January to May and remove the quota permit requirement; prohibit the use of horses during periods open for hunting; and expand scouting opportunities by allowing vehicle access on named roads one day prior to all hunts except small game.

Moody Branch Mitigation Park (NEW) 960 acres – prohibit the possession of any animal, except horses are allowed by permit; limit public access to foot traffic or horses; require persons to enter and exit at designated entrances; and allow public access from 0.5 hours before sunrise until 0.5 hours after sunset.

Perry Oldenburg Mitigation Park – prohibit the possession of any animal; require persons to enter and exit at designated entrances; and allow public access from 0.5 hours before sunrise until 0.5 hours after sunset.

Platt Branch Mitigation Park – require persons to enter and exit at designated entrances; and allow public access from 0.5 hours before sunrise until 0.5 hours after sunset.

North Central Region

Bell Ridge Mitigation Park (NEW) 720 acres – prohibit possession of any animal; allow access only on foot; and allow entrance and exit at designated entrances.

Fort White Mitigation Park - establish three 5-day archery hunts (quota 10, no exemptions); establish a 14-day small game season; establish two 5-day spring turkey hunts (quota 3, no exemptions); establish a falconry season with statewide dates; allow fishing and frogging only along the bank of the Santa Fe River; prohibit trapping; establish as legal to take all legal game, fish, frogs and furbearers; set the bag limit for deer during archery season at one antlered or one antlerless deer per quota permit; set the bag limit for turkey during spring turkey season at one gobbler or bearded turkey per quota permit; require persons enter and exit at designated entrances; allow access from 1.5 hours before sunrise until 1.5 hours after sunset; prohibit possession of any animal, except that dogs may be used for trailing wounded game, bird dogs may be used for hunting during the small game season and falcons may be used during the falconry season; prohibit access by motorized vehicles; remove rule that restricts access to foot traffic only; allow bicycles to be ridden on firebreaks, well-defined roads and trails; allow access during the archery and spring turkey seasons only to persons participating in the hunt; and prohibit the use of centerfire rifles during the spring turkey season.

Lafayette Forest WEA (NEW) 2,148 acres – establish three 5-day archery hunts (quota 15, no exemptions); establish a 3-day muzzleloading gun season (quota 15, no exemptions); establish two 2-day family hunts (quota 10, no exemptions); establish two 5-day wild hog-still hunts (quota 20, no exemptions); establish two 3-day spring turkey hunts (quota 5, no exemptions); establish a falconry season with statewide dates; establish as legal to take all legal game, fish and furbearers; allow fishing year round; prohibit trapping; set the bag limit for deer during the archery season at one antlered or one antlerless deer per quota permit; set the bag limit for deer during the family hunts at one antlered or one antlerless deer per person; set the bag limit for deer during the muzzleloading gun season at one antlered deer per quota permit; set the bag limit for turkeys during the spring turkey season at one gobbler or bearded turkey per quota permit; only allow wild hog to be hunted during the wild hog-still season; require that all persons shall enter and exit at designated entrances; public access will be allowed only from 1.5 hours before sunrise until 1.5 hours after sunset, except that persons with a Special Use Authorization for Mallory Swamp WMA, from the Suwannee River WMD, may travel McCalls Chapel Grade; prohibit possession of any animal, except a dog on a leash may be used for trailing wounded game, dogs may be transported throughout the year on McCall Chapel Grade and falcons may be used during the falconry season; prohibit access by motorized vehicles except on Lafayette Loop and McCall Chapel Grade; allow Lafayette Loop to be driven on only by persons authorized to participate in the hunts and only on hunt days and the day prior to each hunt; during hunting periods access will be limited to persons participating in the hunt,

except that McCall Chapel Grade will be open to the public access year round; and prohibit the use of all-terrain vehicles and unlicensed and unregistered motorcycles. Santa Fe Swamp WEA – allow public access only from 1.5

Santa Fe Swamp WEA – allow public access only from 1.5 hours before sunrise until 1.5 hours after sunset unless in possession of a Special Use Authorization from the Suwannee River Water Management District.

Suwannee Ridge WEA – allow public access only from 1.5 hours before sunrise until 1.5 hours after sunset.

Watermelon Pond WEA (NEW) 4,231 acres – establish a 9-day archery season (no quota); establish two 2-week small game hunts; establish a falconry season with statewide dates; establish as legal to take all legal game, fish and furbearers; prohibit trapping; allow fishing and frogging throughout the year; establish the bag limit for deer of one per person; require persons to enter and exit at designated entrances; prohibit access by motorized vehicles; allow bicycles to be ridden only on named or numbered roads or designated bicycling trails; prohibit the possession of any animal except that horses may be ridden on roads and designated trails, dogs on a leash may be used to track wounded game, bird dogs and waterfowl retrievers may be used for hunting during the small game season and falcons may be used during the falconry season; and allow public access only from 1.5 hours before sunrise until 1.5 hours after sunset.

Northwest Region

Apalachicola River WEA – clarify that there is no crossbow season; establish a wild hog-dog season with five 3-day hunts (quota 5 per hunt, no exemptions) for that portion of the area west of Saul Creek Road, south of a line running east from Misfit Landing to the Apalachicola River and west of the Apalachicola River; allow up to two hunters and one guest, the use of no more than three free-running dogs and only one gun per quota permit during the wild hog-dog hunts; specify that wild hog-dog hunts will begin at 12:01 a.m. on the first day of the hunt and end at 11:59 p.m. (midnight) the last day of the hunt; prohibit hunting from sunrise to sunset during the wild hog-dog season; allow wild hogs to be hunted during the wild hog-dog season by the aid of a light with a firearm, provided that the firearm is not loaded until immediately prior to shooting a bayed hog (hunting of wild hog under this provision by display or use of a light from a moving vehicle, boat or animal is prohibited); and limit camping on Northwest Florida Water Management District lands to no more than 14 consecutive days.

1. Taking wildlife with guns is prohibited.

2. Fires are prohibited.

3. Disturbance or removal of any trees or plants is prohibited.

4. Possession of dogs or trapping devices is prohibited.

5. Access shall be restricted to foot traffic only. No motorized vehicles or horseback riding shall be allowed.

6. Camping is prohibited.

(h) Chinsegut – Hernando County.

1. <u>Public access other than by foot (pedestrian) is</u> <u>prohibited.</u> <u>Unauthorized public access is prohibited on that</u> portion of the area lying east of C.R. 581. Access is permitted by foot traffic only on that portion of the area lying south of the intersection of U.S. 41 and C.R. 581 and west of U.S. 41 known as the Big Pine Tract.

2. Fishing and frogging is prohibited.

1. Public access is prohibited.

(2) North Central Region.

(a) Santa Fe Swamp – Bradford County.

1. Open season (hunting prohibited at other times):

a. Archery – September 25 26 through October 24 25.

b. Muzzleloading gun – October <u>29-31</u> 30 through November 1.

c. Archery and muzzleloading gun – November $\underline{13}$ $\underline{14}$ through January $\underline{9}$ $\underline{10}$.

d. Spring turkey - March 19 20 through April 24 25.

e. Fishing is <u>allowed</u> permitted throughout the year.

2. Legal to take: Wild hog, Ggray squirrel, rabbit, deer with one or more antlers at least five inches in length and fish. Deer (except spotted fawns) and turkey of either sex may be taken during the archery season. Only bearded turkey or gobblers may be taken during the spring turkey season.

3. General regulations:

a. through d. No change.

e. Public access is prohibited from 1.5 hours after sunset until 1.5 hours before sunrise, except by persons possessing a Special Use Authorization from the Suwannee River Water Management District.

(b) Fort White Mitigation Park – Gilchrist County.

e. Trapping - Prohibited.

2. Legal to take: All legal game, fish, frogs and furbearers. During the archery season, the bag limit shall be one antlered or one antlerless deer per quota permit. During the spring turkey season, the bag limit shall be one gobbler or bearded turkey per quota permit.

b. Mobility-impaired spring turkey – March 25-27 26-28 and April 15-17 16-18.

2. Legal to take: Any deer (except spotted fawn), wild hog, <u>gobbler or</u> bearded turkey (during spring turkey season only), gray squirrel, and rabbit. The bag limit shall be two deer or two bearded turkeys per quota permit. Only certified mobility-impaired hunters may take an antlerless deer.

(d) No change.

(e) Bell Ridge Mitigation Park.

1. Possession of any animal is prohibited.

2. Public access other than by foot (pedestrian) is prohibited.

<u>3. All persons shall enter and exit the area only at designated entrances.</u>

(f) Lafayette Forest Wildlife and Environmental Area

1. Open seasons:

a. Archery season – September 25-29, October 1-5 and 8-12.

b. Muzzleloading gun season - October 29-31.

c. Family hunt - November 13-14 and 20-21.

d. Wild hog-still – January 29 through February 2 and February 5-9.

e. Spring turkey – March 19-21 and 25-27.

f. Fishing - Allowed year round.

g. Trapping – Prohibited.

<u>h.</u> Falconry – Game may be taken by falconry during established statewide seasons that coincide with periods when the area is otherwise open for public use or hunting.

2. Legal to take: All legal game, fish and furbearers. During the archery season the bag limit shall be one antlered or one antlerless deer per quota permit. During the family hunt the bag limit shall be one antlered or one antlerless deer per person. During the muzzleloading gun season, the bag limit shall be one antlered deer per quota permit. During the wild hog-still season, only wild hog may be taken. During the spring turkey season, the bag limit shall be one gobbler or bearded turkey per quota permit.

RULE NO.:RULE TITLE:68A-19.005General Regulations Relating to
Critical Wildlife Areas

PURPOSE AND EFFECT: The purpose of the proposed changes is to provide a new title and to clarify rule language while retaining the intent of the existing regulations for Critical Wildlife Areas (CWAs). The effect is to reduce citizen confusion, allow for more effective CWA management, improve conservation for imperiled wildlife, and improve enforcement.

SUMMARY: The proposed rule changes would: allow for area-specific regulations that differ from those in this section to be stated in the establishment order for the CWA; require that portions of the CWA to be managed will be posted as a "Critical Wildlife Area"; prohibit public access, including vehicles, boats, and dogs in areas posted as "Closed to Public Access"; prohibit dogs only in areas posted as "Dogs Prohibited"; and allow the Executive Director to issue permits for scientific or conservation purposes on CWAs where public access is prohibited.

SUMMARY OF STATEMENT OF ESTIMATED REGULATORY COSTS: The agency has determined that this rule will _____or will not __X__have an impact on small business. A SERC has _____ or has not _X_ been prepared by the agency.

68A-27.0001 Purpose and Intent.

(1) The purpose and intent of this rule chapter is to conserve or improve the status of endangered and threatened species in Florida to effectively reduce the risk of extinction through the use of a science-informed process that is objective and quantifiable, that accurately identifies endangered and threatened species that are in need of special actions to prevent further imperilment, that identifies a framework for developing management strategies and interventions to reduce threats causing imperilment, and that will prevent species from being threatened to such an extent that they become regulated and managed under the federal Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended, 16 U.S.C. §1531 et seq. (2) The Commission shall include in its annual work plan the Florida Endangered and Threatened species it will focus on in the next fiscal year. Work shall include but not be limited to species evaluation requests, management plan development and implementation, and other conservation actions.

(3) The protections of this rule chapter shall not prohibit lawful hunting, fishing or other recreational activities when those activities result in annoyance or disturbance of Florida Endangered and Threatened Species.

(4) The Commission does not intend to prohibit actions taken on an emergency basis necessary to address public safety.

(5) This rule chapter is not intended to exercise regulatory authority over those species under Legislative authority. The Commission will continue to regulate those species to the extent authorized by Florida Statute.

68A-27.001 Definitions.

When used in this rule chapter, the terms and phrases listed below have the meaning provided:

(1) Florida Endangered and Threatened Species – species of fish or wild animal life, subspecies or isolated populations of species or subspecies, whether vertebrate or invertebrate, that are native to Florida which are endangered and threatened under Commission rule as either: (a) Federally-designated Endangered and Threatened species by virtue of designation as endangered or threatened by the United States Departments of Interior or Commerce under the Endangered Species Act, 16 U.S.C. § 1531, et seq. and rules thereto or (b) as a State-designated Threatened species. Florida Endangered and Threatened species retain their status regardless of subsequent changes in scientific nomenclature or subsequent identification of species or subspecies within the species listed.

(2) Federally-designated Endangered and Threatened Species – species of fish or wild animal life, subspecies or isolated populations of species or subspecies, whether vertebrate or invertebrate, that are native to Florida and are classified as Endangered and Threatened under Commission rule by virtue of designation by the United States Departments of Interior or Commerce as endangered or threatened under the Federal Endangered Species Act, 16 U.S.C. § 1531 et seq. and rules thereto.

(3) State-designated Threatened Species – As designated by the Commission, species of fish or wild animal life, subspecies, or isolated population of a species or subspecies, whether vertebrate or invertebrate, that are native to Florida and are classified as Threatened as determined by paragraph (a), (b), (c), (d), or (e) below in accordance with Rule 68A-27.0012, F.A.C. The designation of a species as threatened shall include all subspecies unless stated otherwise in Commission rule. (a) Reduction in population size based on any of the following:

<u>1. An observed, estimated, inferred or suspected</u> population size reduction of at least 50% over the last 10 years or three generations, whichever is the longer, where the causes of the reduction are: clearly reversible and understood and ceased, based on (and specifying) any of the following:

a. Direct observation,

b. An index of abundance appropriate to the taxon,

c. A decline in area of occupancy, extent of occurrence and/or quality of habitat,

d. Actual or potential levels of exploitation,

e. The effects of introduced taxa, hybridization, pathogens, pollutants, competitors or parasites.

2. An observed, estimated, inferred or suspected population size reduction of at least 30% over the last 10 years or three generations, whichever is the longer, where the reduction or its causes may not have ceased or may not be understood or may not be reversible, based on (and specifying) any of sub-subparagraph (a)1.a. to (a)1.e., above.

<u>3. A population size reduction of at least 30%, projected or</u> <u>suspected to be met within the next 10 years or three</u> <u>generations, whichever is the longer (up to a maximum of 100</u> <u>years), based on (and specifying) any of sub-subparagraph</u> (a)1.b. to (a)1.e., above.

4. An observed, estimated, inferred, projected or suspected population size reduction of at least 30% over any 10 year or three generation period, whichever is longer (up to a maximum of 100 years in the future), where the time period must include both the past and the future, and where the reduction or its causes may not have ceased or may not be understood or may not be reversible, based on (and specifying) any of sub-subparagraph (a)1.a. to (a)1.e, above.

(b) Geographic range in the form of either subparagraph (b)1. (extent of occurrence) or (b)2. (area of occupancy) or both:

<u>1. Extent of occurrence estimated to be less than 20,000</u> square kilometers (7,722 square miles), and estimates indicating at least two of a.-c.:

a. Severely fragmented or known to exist at no more than 10 locations.

b. Continuing decline, observed, inferred or projected, in any of the following:

(i) extent of occurrence,

(ii) area of occupancy,

(iii) area, extent and/or quality of habitat.

(iv) number of locations or subpopulations,

(v) number of mature individuals.

c. Extreme fluctuations in any of the following:

(i) extent of occurrence,

(ii) area of occupancy,

(iii) number of locations or subpopulations,

(iv) number of mature individuals.

2. Area of occupancy estimated to be less than 2,000 square kilometers (772 square miles), and estimates indicating at least two of a.-c.:

a. Severely fragmented or known to exist at no more than 10 locations.

b. Continuing decline, observed, inferred or projected, in any of the following:

(i) extent of occurrence,

(ii) area of occupancy,

(iii) area, extent and/or quality of habitat,

(iv) number of locations or subpopulations,

(v) number of mature individuals.

c. Extreme fluctuations in any of the following:

(i) extent of occurrence,

(ii) area of occupancy,

(iii) number of locations or subpopulations,

(iv) number of mature individuals.

(c) Population size estimated to number fewer than 10,000 mature individuals and either:

<u>1. An estimated continuing decline of at least 10% within</u> <u>10 years or three generations, whichever is longer, (up to a</u> <u>maximum of 100 years in the future); or</u>

2. A continuing decline, observed, projected, or inferred, in numbers of mature individuals and at least one of the following (a.-b.):

a. Population structure in the form of one of the following:

(i) no subpopulation estimated to contain more than 1000 mature individuals; or

(ii) all mature individuals are in one subpopulation.

b. Extreme fluctuations in number of mature individuals.

(d) Population very small or restricted in the form of either of the following:

<u>1. Population size estimated to number fewer than 1000 mature individuals.</u>

2. Population with a very restricted area of occupancy (typically less than 20 square kilometers [8 square miles]) or number of locations (typically five or fewer) such that it is prone to the effects of human activities or stochastic events within a very short time period in an uncertain future, and is thus capable of becoming endangered or threatened or even extinct in a very short time period.

(e) Quantitative analysis showing the probability of extinction in the wild is at least 10% within 100 years.

(4) Take – to harass, harm, pursue, hunt, shoot, wound, kill, trap, capture, or collect, or to attempt to engage in such conduct. The term "harm" in the definition of take means an act which actually kills or injures fish or wildlife. Such act shall include acts that actually kill or injure wildlife by significantly impairing essential behavioral patterns, including breeding, feeding or sheltering. The term "harass" in the definition of take means an intentional or negligent act or omission which creates the likelihood of injury to wildlife. "Harass" shall include annoying fish or wildlife only if the annoyance creates the likelihood of injury by significantly disrupting normal behavioral patterns which include, but are not limited to, breeding, feeding or sheltering.

(5) Incidental take – any taking otherwise prohibited, if such taking is incidental to, and not the purpose of the carrying out of an otherwise lawful activity.

(6) Management plan - a document created or adopted by the Commission with the purpose of providing guidance for the management of the species. The intent of management plans is to provide guidance to conserve species so that their status improves and the species can be removed from the Florida Endangered and Threatened Species list as well as to provide guidance to conserve the species so that they will not again need to be listed. It shall be a comprehensive, single-species management plan; or a document involving a multi-species plan; or a document indicating the specified rule or rules; or a reference to a federal recovery plan that will be used for guidance in the management of the species. The management plan shall address biological status; identify measurable conservation objectives, including a time frame; identify any exempt activities if appropriate; identify conservation actions; identify incentives if appropriate; recommend rules for species if warranted; address anticipated economic, ecological, and social impacts of implementing or not implementing the management plan; and include a revision schedule.

(7) Native – a species, subspecies or isolated populations of species or subspecies that occur naturally in Florida or that has been reintroduced into its historic range, rather than occurring in Florida as a result of accidental or deliberate introduction by humans.

(8) Candidate species – A species of fish or wild animal life, subspecies, or isolated populations of species or subspecies, whether invertebrate or vertebrate, that the Commission has determined warrants listing as a State-designated Threatened Species in accordance with Rule 68A-27.0012, F.A.C., and is awaiting final Commission action to be added to the list of Florida Endangered and Threatened Species in Rule 68A-27.003, F.A.C.

(9) Isolated population – A significant and discrete population of a species or subspecies of fish or wild animal life that is reproductively separated from other populations of the same species or subspecies as a consequence of physical, ecological, or other factors.

(10) Data deficient – the condition where a species was evaluated and found to have insufficient scientific and commercial data to recommend a listing status for the species.

68A-27.0012 Procedures for Listing, <u>and</u> Removing Species from <u>Florida's</u> and <u>Reclassifying</u> Endangered <u>and</u>, Threatened and Species List of Special Concern.

(1) Federally-designated Endangered and Threatened Species. Species which are native to Florida and which are designated as Endangered or Threatened under the Federal Endangered Species Act (ESA), 15 U.S.C. § 1531 et seq. and rules thereto will be listed by the Commission as a Florida Endangered and Threatened Species by virtue of the federal designation. If a species native to Florida is added or reclassified under the ESA, the species shall be so listed or reclassified in the Florida Endangered and Threatened Species rule pursuant to the notice provisions of Section 120.54(6), F.S. relating to adoption of federal standards. Before species that have been removed from the ESA are removed from the Florida Endangered and Threatened Species rule, they shall receive a biological status review according to subparagraph (2)(c)2., to determine if the species warrants listing as a state-designated species. Prior to any species being removed from the Florida Endangered and Threatened Species list, the Commission shall develop a management plan that is intended to maintain or enhance the conservation of that species.

(2) State-designated Threatened Species.

(a) Notwithstanding the provisions contained in this subsection, these procedures shall not be applied to the following species:

<u>1. Federally-designated Endangered and Threatened</u> species, except when those species are scheduled to be removed from the federal list,

2. Species not native to Florida,

<u>3. Harvested species that are monitored through periodic</u> stock assessments or other techniques and are the subject of any rule in Title 68, F.A.C. that allows harvest.

4. Species whose occurrence in Florida is only accidental.

(b) Requesting the evaluation of a species for listing or removal from the State-designated Threatened species list.

<u>1. Persons requesting that the Commission list on or</u> remove a species from the State-designated Threatened species list must submit a written species evaluation request to the Commission through the Division of Habitat and Species Conservation, Tallahassee, Florida. The Commission can also initiate species evaluation requests. Species evaluation requests shall be submitted from January 1 through June 30 and will be reviewed for completeness and considered for evaluation in the listing process from July 1 through September 30.

2. Species evaluation requests shall be clearly identified as such, and must contain the following in order to be considered complete:

a. The name, address, and signature of the person or persons submitting the request,

b. Scientific and common name of the species,

c. Sufficient information on the biology and distribution of the species to warrant investigation of its status using the criteria contained in the definition of a State-designated Threatened species. For listing requests, this information shall also include a biological score calculated according to the process initially described in Millsap, B. A., J. A. Gore, D. E. Runde, and S. I. Cerulean, Wildlife Monographs: Setting Priorities for the Conservation of Fish and Wildlife Species in Florida (Wildlife Monographs 111, July 1990, and as subsequently modified), the data, or references to data, and the score assigned for each biological variable used to determine the biological score. The information submitted with the request must include or reference the best scientific and commercial data available regarding the species.

3. Incomplete species evaluation requests, including requests which do not include or reference the best scientific and commercial data available, will be returned to the requestor with insufficiencies clearly noted in writing. Corrected species evaluation requests may be resubmitted for consideration outside the submission time period identified in 1. above if resubmitted within 30 days of being returned. Corrected species evaluation requests resubmitted more than 30 days after being returned must be submitted within the time period identified in subparagraph 1., above.

<u>4. Complete species evaluation requests will be evaluated</u> <u>in accordance with the provisions in paragraph (2)(c) for listing</u> <u>or (3)(b) for removal from the list.</u>

5. Emergency listing requests may be submitted at any time and, if in the opinion of the Executive Director, immediate designation of a species as a State-designated Threatened species is essential to prevent imminent extinction, such listing may be effected on a temporary basis by Executive Order; provided that the Executive Order shall be approved or terminated at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the Commission. Commission staff shall, within 365 days after the effective date of such approval, conduct the evaluations prescribed in paragraphs (2)(c), (2)(d), and (2)(e) of this rule to determine if the species should be listed as State-designated Threatened. The Commission shall take final action on the listing at the next regularly scheduled meeting following the 365-day evaluation period.

(c) Determining if listing is warranted.

<u>1. Biological vulnerability screening – The Commission</u> staff shall review the information used to determine the biological score submitted with the species evaluation request. Using that information, and all other available scientific and commercial information staff shall determine a final biological score for the species for the purpose of further reviewing the species evaluation request.

a. If the final biological score is greater than or equal to 27, then the species evaluation request will be further evaluated under subparagraph (c)2. Biological Status Review below.

b. If the final biological score is less than 19, then no further action will be taken on the request and the requester will be notified of the score.

c. If the final biological score is greater than or equal to 19 and less than 27, then staff shall review the submitted and other available information on population trend, population size, extent of occurrence, area of occupancy, and quantitative analyses to recommend to the Commission whether the species evaluation request will be further evaluated under subparagraph (c)2. Biological Status Review below or returned to the requestor with no further action taken.

d. If the data and analysis within a request demonstrate that the species would qualify for listing by meeting at least one of the listing criteria for a State-designated Threatened species in Rule 68A-27.001, F.A.C., regardless of the biological score, then the species evaluation request will be further evaluated under subparagraph (c)2. Biological Status Review below.

2. Biological Status Review.

a. The Commission shall establish an annual work plan for investigating species evaluation requests meeting the biological vulnerability screening threshold, which considers the Commission's conservation priorities and available resources. The work plan shall establish a deadline for completion of each biological status review. Complete species evaluation requests meeting the biological vulnerability screening threshold not identified for staff action will be reconsidered each subsequent year.

b. The Commission staff shall provide notification to parties who request such notification and shall publish in the Florida Administrative Weekly a solicitation for information on the biological status of the species being evaluated. Written comments regarding biological status shall be accepted by the Commission for a period of no less than 45 days following public notice.

c. Commission staff shall recommend and the Commission shall designate a biological review group of scientists with demonstrated knowledge of species conservation and management that consists of an odd number of three to seven members. The biological review group shall use information provided in the species evaluation request, information obtained from the public, the definition of a State-designated Threatened species in Rule 68A-27.001, F.A.C., and the best available scientific and commercial biological data on the status of the species to determine if the species status meets the criteria for listing as a State-designated Threatened species. When assessing a species, this group shall follow the most recent versions of "Guidelines for Using the IUCN Red List Categories and Criteria" and "Guidelines for Application of IUCN Red List Criteria at Regional Levels" available at www.iucnredlist.org. The Commission staff shall present the group's findings in a biological status report, and shall include a recommendation on whether or not the species status meets the criteria for listing as a State-designated Threatened species based on the IUCN guidelines and criteria in Rule 68A-27.001, F.A.C. In addition, the Staff may provide within the report a biologically-justified opinion that differs from the criteria-based finding.

d. Commission staff shall seek a minimum of three independent scientists to conduct reviews focused on the science used in the biological status report, including methodologies, data, analyses, and interpretations. Reviewers will be provided no less than 45 days to comment on the biological status report.

e. The Commission shall consider the biological status report, independent scientific reviews received, and public comments regarding the biological status in making a final determination whether listing a species is warranted.

f. The nongame work plan will include species that did not qualify as threatened in this section but were identified during the process as needing special attention to prevent future listing. This work plan will be used to set priorities for nongame management and conservation actions.

g. If a species is determined by the Commission to warrant listing, the Commission shall:

i. Establish a deadline for developing a management plan for the species as described in paragraph (2)(d) below, considering the recommendation of staff and other interested parties.

ii. Add the species to the list of candidate species in Rule 68A-27.0021, F.A.C., and the protective provisions therein shall apply to the species.

(d) Developing management plans.

<u>1. A management plan will be developed for species that</u> the Commission has determined warrant listing before final action is taken to list the species.

2. Within 45 days following the meeting where the Commission determined that listing was warranted, the Commission shall provide notification to parties who request such notification and shall publish in the Florida Administrative Weekly a solicitation of information on the conservation needs of the species, and any economic and social factors that should be considered in its management. Written comments regarding conservation needs and economic and social factors to consider in creating the management plan shall be accepted by the Commission for a period of no less than 45 days following public notice.

3. The Commission staff shall use information obtained from the public and other available information to develop a draft management plan for each species that the Commission has determined warrants listing. The positive and negative social and economic impacts shall be considered in creation of the draft management plan.

4. The Commission staff shall provide notification to parties who request such notification and shall publish in the Florida Administrative Weekly a notice of the availability of the draft management plan. Written comments regarding conservation recommendations and expected economic and social impacts of implementation of the management plan shall be accepted by the Commission for a period of no less than 45 days following public notice.

(e) Final Commission action on the species evaluation request shall include:

1. Acceptance of the management plan.

2. Deletion of the species from the candidate species list in Rule 68A-27.0021, F.A.C., if appropriate, and changes to Rule 68A-27.003, F.A.C., in accordance with the determination made in paragraph (2)(c) of this rule.

<u>3. Adoption of any proposed rules submitted in support of the management plan.</u>

(3) Criteria for removal from the State-designated Threatened species list are as follows:

(a) Species listed as State-designated Threatened species as of the effective date of this rule: Management plans will be developed for the species listed in this rule and the species will be evaluated under the listing criteria in subsection 68A-27.001(3), F.A.C. Species that are determined to be data deficient pursuant to the Guidelines for Using the IUCN Red List Categories and Criteria shall not be removed from the State-designated Threatened species list.

(b) All State-designated Threatened species listed after the effective date of this rule: Individuals may submit species evaluation requests for removing species from the list as described in the species evaluation request process in paragraph (2)(b). Species shall be removed from the State-designated Threatened species list if they do not meet any of the criteria in Rule 68A-27.001, F.A.C., in accordance with the Guidelines for Using the IUCN Red List Categories and Criteria.

(4) There is a moratorium for two years after the effective date of this rule on new requests for listing or removal of species to or from the State-designated Threatened Species list, except for emergency actions, in order to facilitate development of management plans for species currently on this list. <u>Rulemaking</u> Specific Authority Art. 68A-27.006 Reward Program.

In order to implement a reward program for the <u>reporting of</u> illegal killing, wounding or wrongful possession of <u>Florida</u> Endangered <u>and or</u> Threatened Species as defined herein the Commission establishes the following schedule and procedures.

(1) The Commission will receive information through its <u>Wildlife Alert Reward Program</u> WATS lines in the respective regional offices of the five regions. The party <u>providing ealling</u> in the information will be identified by a code only and all names, if given, will be kept confidential unless the party specifically authorizes the use of his <u>or her</u> name. Information will be given to the party on the method to maintain contact with the Commission in order to properly pursue the matter.

(2) Upon conviction based upon the information received the party supplying information which leads to such conviction will be transmitted <u>a reward</u> funds determined by a predetermined schedule in the following manner:

(a) If the party authorizes the use of his name a check in the appropriate amount will be forwarded directly to the party.

(b) If this party desires to remain anonymous a check in the appropriate amount will be made out to the regional enforcement supervisor and the regional manager of the involved region. After endorsement by both parties the check will be cashed and the money delivered by the regional enforcement supervisor and the regional manager to the party at a mutually agreeable time and place.

(3) Payment for information received which leads to a conviction will be according to the following schedule:

(a) Category I – Conviction for the unlawful taking or attempting to take or possession of an endangered or threatened species will be \$250.

(b) Category II – Conviction for selling or attempting to sell or for the unlawful taking or attempting to take or for possession of more than one endangered or threatened species will be \$500.

<u>6. Whether the expertise, facilities, or other resources</u> <u>available to the applicant are adequate to successfully</u> accomplish the objective stated in the application.

(b) Incidental take: The Commission may issue permits authorizing incidental take of State-designated Threatened species upon a conclusion that the permitted activities and all proposed mitigation will provide an overall conservation benefit for the species and no negative impact on the survival potential of the species. Factors which shall be considered in determining whether a permit may be granted are:

<u>1. The objectives of a federal recovery plan or a state</u> management plan for the species sought to be taken;

2. The foreseeable long range impact over time if take of the species is authorized;

3. The impacts to other fish and wildlife species if take is authorized;

4. The extent of injury, harm or loss of the species;

5. Whether the incidental take could reasonably be avoided, minimized or mitigated by the permit applicant;

6. Human safety; and

7. Other factors relevant to the conservation and management of the species.

(c) Land management activities that benefit wildlife or agriculture, as defined in Section 570.02, Florida Statutes, conducted in accordance with Department of Agriculture and Consumer Service's adopted best management practices and that are not inconsistent with Management Plans for species as defined in this rule chapter are authorized and do not require a permit authorizing incidental take despite any other provision of this section.

(d) Wildlands fire suppression actions necessary to ensure public safety during emergency circumstances are authorized and do not require a permit authorizing incidental take despite any other provision of this section, unless specified in management plans for species as defined in this rule chapter.

68B-24.0055 Commercial Requirements; Appeals PURPOSE AND EFFECT: The purpose of these rule amendments is to modify the Commission's spiny lobster rule to extend the current moratorium on the issuance of new commercial dive lobster endorsements. The commercial lobster dive endorsement was created for the 2004/2005 fishing license year. Holders of this endorsement are allowed to commercially harvest spiny lobsters in state and federal waters while SCUBA diving. Commercial harvest or possession of spiny lobsters on or within 10 yards of any artificial habitat is prohibited and there is a harvest and possession limit of 250 lobsters per day per vessel in Broward, Dade, Monroe, Collier and Lee Counties.

Initial endorsements were granted to lobster harvesters who documented landings of lobsters by diving between July 1, 2000, through June 30, 2003. Four hundred-four dive endorsements were initially issued. At the same time a moratorium was placed on the issuance of new dive endorsements from January 1, 2005 until July 1, 2010. During this time no new commercial dive permits have been or will be issued and no commercial dive permit will be renewed or replaced except those that were active during the 2004-2005 fishing season. The moratorium was put in place to stabilize the fishery and to control the effort of the newly-expanding fishery.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Research Institute is currently investigating the effects of artificial habitat on the surrounding marine environment. This research is ongoing and is scheduled to be completed after the moratorium on the issuance of new commercial lobster dive endorsements is scheduled to expire. The outcome of this research could affect future lobster management decisions; therefore, deferring management changes until after the research is completed is recommended.

The effect of this rule amendment is that the moratorium on the issuance of new spiny lobster fishery commercial dive endorsements will continue until research related to artificial habitat is completed and possible resulting management options are considered. The expiration date of the moratorium on new commercial dive permits would be changed from July 1, 2010 to July 1, 2015.

SUMMARY: Rule 68B-24.0055, F.A.C. (Commercial Requirements; Appeals) would be amended by extending the expiration date of the moratorium on new commercial dive permits from July 1, 2010 until July 1, 2015.

PURPOSE AND EFFECT: The purpose of these rule amendments is to modify the Commission's Sharks and Rays Rule to further protect lemon sharks, Negaprion brevirostris, in state waters of Florida. The Commission is considering changes to state regulations that would prohibit the recreational and commercial harvest of lemon sharks in all state waters of Florida. This is necessary because this species is the most vulnerable of all 33 large coastal shark species of the Atlantic Ocean. In Florida waters lemon sharks are often found near shore in shallow water. They aggregate in large groups off Florida's southeast coast and these aggregation seasons and sites are predictable. This behavior makes them easy to locate year after year. Although adult lemon sharks found in Florida travel to the Carolinas, Marquesas, and Bahamas, these sharks return to aggregate off Florida's coast annually. Because of these behaviors, large numbers of individuals could be removed from the population with minimal effort by harvesters. Lemon sharks are also susceptible to overharvest because of their life history characteristics. Lemon sharks are a slow-growing species that reaches sexual maturity at 12-15 years of age and at lengths of around 90 inches or greater. This species has low reproductive potential, producing only 6 to 18 pups per litter, every second or third year. Additionally, lemon sharks experience annual mortality of 40-60 percent while juvenile.

The effect of these rule amendments is that the lemon shark population will be protected in Florida waters, where this species is the most vulnerable to the fishery.

SUMMARY: Rule 68B-44.002, F.A.C. (Definitions) would be amended by removing lemon shark from the list of large coastal species that can be harvested under the definition of sharks. Bridge; bounded on the northwest by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Loxahatchee River 300 feet northwest of the northwest end of the fender of the Florida East Coast Railroad bridge located adjacent to the SR 811 (Alternate A-1-A) Bridge; bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 500 feet south of the south end of the fender of the SR 706 (Indiantown Rd.) Bridge; and bounded on the east by a line drawn due north across the Jupiter Inlet from the western tip of the jetty at DuBois Park to the southwest corner of Jupiter Island, and including all waters of and tributaries to Sawfish Bay and the Jupiter River, as depicted in drawing A.

(b) Donald Ross Bridge – A Slow Speed Minimum Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the north by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet north of the north end of the fender of the Donald Ross Bridge, and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet south of the south end of the fender of the bridge, as depicted in drawing B.

(c) Bert Winter Park Boat Ramp – An Idle Speed No Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the north by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet north of the centerline of the Bert Winter Park boat ramp, and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet south of the centerline of the Bert Winter Park boat ramp, as depicted in drawing C.

(d) Juno Park Boat Ramp to PGA Boulevard Bridge – An Idle Speed No Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the north by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet north of Juno Park, and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 3,000 feet south of the PGA Blvd. bridge, as depicted in drawing D.

(e) US 1 (SR 5) Bridge – An Idle Speed Minimum Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the northwest by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 500 feet northwest of the northwest end of the fender of the US 1 (SR 5) bridge, and bounded on southeast by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, headland to headland, across the mouth of Lake Worth Creek at its southern terminus at Lake Worth, as depicted in drawing E.

(f) Peanut Island, Blue Heron Bridge and Lake Worth Inlet - A Slow Speed Minimum Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway including all waters of Lake Worth, bounded on the north by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway at the north shoreline of Phil Foster Island, from the mainland at Riviera Beach to Singer Island; bounded on the southeast by a line drawn from the southwest corner of Singer Island to the nearest channel marker marking the northern edge of the Lake Worth Inlet Channel (flashing marker "8") and running along the line of channel markers marking the northern edge of the Lake Worth Inlet Channel and the Port of Palm Beach Turning Basin to the westernmost channel marker marking the northern edge of the Port of Palm Beach Turning Basin (flashing marker "12"); and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, from the westernmost channel marker marking the northern edge of the Port of Palm Beach Turning Basin to the mainland at the southeast corner of the Port of Palm Beach Slip 1, Berth 6, Bay 49, as depicted in drawing F.

(g) Flagler Memorial Bridge – A Slow Speed Minimum Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the north by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 1,100 feet north of the north end of the fender of the Flagler Memorial Bridge, and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 1,500 feet south of the south bridge fender, as depicted in drawing G.

(h) SR 704 (Royal Park) Bridge – A Slow Speed Minimum Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the north by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet north of the north end of the fender of the SR 704 (Royal Park) Bridge and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet south of the southernmost dock of the Town of Palm Beach Public Docks (Peruvian Ave.), as depicted in drawing H.

(i) SR 80 (Southern Blvd.) Bridge – A Slow Speed Minimum Wake zone, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the north by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet north of the north end of the bridge fender of the SR 80 (Southern Blvd.) Bridge, and bounded on the east by a line drawn parallel to and 500 feet east of the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway and the western shoreline of Bingham Island and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet south of the south end of the bridge fender, as depicted in drawing I.

(j) SR 802 (Lake Worth) Bridge – A Slow Speed Minimum Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the north by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet north of the north end of the fender of the SR 802 (Lake Worth) Bridge, and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet south of the centerline of the Bryant Park boat ramp, as depicted in drawing J.

(k) SR 812 (Lantana Ave.) Bridge – A Slow Speed Minimum Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the north by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway at the north end of Hypoluxo Island and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet south of the south end of the bridge fender, as depicted in drawing K.

(1) SR 804 (East Ocean Ave.) Bridge – An Idle Speed No Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the north by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 575 feet north of the north end of the fender of the SR 804 (East Ocean Ave.) Bridge, and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet south of the south end of the bridge fender, as depicted in drawing L.

(m) 15th Ave. (Woolbright Rd.) Bridge – A Slow Speed Minimum Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the north by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet north of the north end of the fender of the 15th Avenue (Woolbright Rd.) Bridge, and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet south of the south end of the bridge fender, as depicted in drawing M.

(n) NE 8th Street (George Bush Blvd.) Bridge – An Idle Speed No Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the north by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet north of the north end of the fender of the NE 8th Street (George Bush Blvd.) Bridge, and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 600 feet south of the south end of the bridge fender, as depicted in drawing N.

(o) SR 806 (East Atlantic Ave.) Bridge – A Slow Speed Minimum Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the north by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet north of the north end of the fender of the SR 806 (East Atlantic Ave.) Bridge, and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, 500 feet north of the centerline of the Knowles Park boat ramp, as depicted in drawing O.

(p) Knowles Park Boat Ramp – An Idle Speed No Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the north by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, 500 feet north of the centerline of the Knowles Park boat ramp, and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet north of the north end of the fender of the 12th Street (Linton Blvd.) Bridge, as depicted in drawing P.

(q) 12th Street (Linton Blvd.) Bridge – A Slow Speed Minimum Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the north by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet north of the north end of fender of the 12th Street (Linton Blvd.) Bridge, and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet south of the south end of the bridge fender, as depicted in drawing Q. (r) SR 800 (Spanish River Blvd.) Bridge – A Slow Speed Minimum Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the north by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet north of the north end of the fender of the SR 800 (Spanish River Blvd.) Bridge, and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet south of the south end of the bridge fender, as depicted in drawing R.

(s) SR 798 (Palmetto Park Rd.) Bridge and Silver Palm Park Boat Ramp Zones

1. Lake Wyman Vicinity to SR 798 (Palmetto Park Rd.) Bridge – A Slow Speed Minimum Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, in the vicinity of marker 63 (which is in the southern portion of Lake Wyman), and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet north of the northern end of the fender system of the SR 798 (Palmetto Park Rd.) Bridge, as depicted in drawing S.

2. Silver Palm Park Boat Ramp and SR 798 Bridge – An Idle Speed No Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the north by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet north of the north end of the fender of the SR 798 (Palmetto Park Rd.) Bridge, and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 500 feet south of the centerline of the Silver Palm Park boat ramp, as depicted in drawing S.

(t) A-1-A (Ocean Ave). Bridge – A Slow Speed Minimum Wake zone from shoreline to shoreline, in the Boca Raton Inlet, bounded on the northwest by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the channel 300 feet northwest of the northwest end of the fender of the A-1-A (Ocean Ave.) Bridge, and bounded on the south by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the channel 300 feet south of the south end of the bridge fender, as depicted in drawing T.

(u) Camino Real Zones -

Camino Real Bridge – A Slow Speed Minimum Wake</u> <u>zone from shoreline to shoreline, in and adjacent to the Florida</u> <u>Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the north by a line drawn</u> <u>perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal</u> <u>Waterway 300 feet north of the north end of the fender of the</u> <u>Camino Real Bridge, and bounded on the south by a line drawn</u> <u>perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal</u> <u>Waterway 300 feet south of the south end of the bridge fender,</u> <u>as depicted in drawing U.</u>

2. Camino Real Bridge to Palm Beach-Broward County Line – A Slow Speed Minimum Wake zone to be in effect from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Saturdays, Sundays, and Holidays, in and adjacent to the Florida Intracoastal Waterway, bounded on the north by a line drawn perpendicular to the centerline of the Florida Intracoastal Waterway 300 feet south of the south end of the fender of the Camino Real Bridge, and bounded on the south by the Palm Beach-Broward County Line, as depicted in drawing U.
