Dear Secretary Williams:

You have requested this office declare Fiji to be a reciprocating state for purposes of Ch. 88, F.S., the Revised Uniform Reciprocal Enforcement of Support Act (1968).

Section 88.0405(1), F.S., provides that the Attorney General may declare a foreign nation to be a reciprocating state for purposes of Ch. 88, F.S., if he finds that reciprocal provisions are available in the foreign nation for the enforcement of support orders issued in the State of Florida. This office has been supplied with copies of the pertinent provisions of the laws of Fiji relating to the enforcement of support orders.

According to your letter, Fiji has enacted the Maintenance Orders (Reciprocal Enforcement) Act. The act permits Fiji to assist citizens of foreign counties in their efforts to obtain child support when a custodial parent lives in the foreign country and the responsible parent lives in Fiji.

Pursuant to s. 3 of the act, the Minister, if satisfied that similar benefits will in a country or territory be applied to maintenance orders made by the courts of Fiji, may by order designate that country or territory as a reciprocating country. Where a certified copy of a maintenance order made by a reciprocating country is received by the Minister from the responsible authority in the reciprocating country and it appears that the payer under the order is residing in Fiji, the act provides that the Minister shall send a copy of the order to the appropriate court.

When the court receives the certified copy, the prescribed officer of the court registers the order in the appropriate form

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or in the prescribed manner in that court. A registered order may be enforced in Fiji as if it had been made by the registering court and as if that court had had jurisdiction to make it.

It, therefore, appears that reciprocal provisions for the enforcement of support orders issued in the State of Florida are available under Fiji law. I am, therefore, of the opinion that pursuant to s. 88.0405, F.S., Fiji may be declared to be a reciprocating state.
